CORBETT MAN DIES IN PORTLAND HOSPITAL

Floyd E. Reed, aged 38 years, a resident of the Corbett community, died Sunday, May 23, at Good Samaritan hospital. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at Finley's chapel, with commitment services at Rose City cemetery under the auspices of Fairview lodge No. 92, A.F. & A.M. Dr. H. L. Bowman, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland officiated at the service which was beautiful and impressive. The floral contributions were many, the Masonic lodge, the Eastern Star, the Rainbow girls, the Sunday school at Corbett and the Parent-Teacher association each contributing floral pieces.

Mr. Reed is survived by his widow, Maude Reed, of Corbett, also by three children, Bella, Donald and Floyd W. Reed; three sisters and four brothers, Mrs. Albert Fox and Mrs. Dean Hanson, of Portland, Mrs. Louis Bradley, Frank, Fred, Favor and Lewis Reed. His mother, Mrs. Myrtle Reed, also survives.

Those who have been intimately acquainted with the deceased for the past 25 years or longer speak very highly of him. He was of an amiable disposition, quiet and refined and most devoted to his family. Just before death claimed him he asked his wife to throw him an anchor as though he were ready to make his last landing. Accordingly the fishermen, with whom Mr. Reed was associated for years in the fishing industry on the Columbia sent a beautiful anchor of water lilies and other flowers.

The pallbearers were Ward Evans, A. R. Morgan, Charles Bramhall, E. L. Shelton, Roy Anderson and Perry Settlemeier, all members of the Masonic lodge.

SPRAY FOR FRUIT FLY SHOULD BE APPLIED

The cherry fruit fly has made its appearance and it is now time to apply the first spray. They were identified at Salem in Marion county, at Eugene in Lane county and in Yamhill county, Tuesday, May 25. There is no doubt but by the time you read this item they will have been found in this section. As the fly is only out a few days before it begins depositing eggs it is important that the spray be put on promptly.

For this spray use 1/2 pound arsenate of lead, 2 quarts of syrup or molasses, 10 gallons of water. Use a proportionate amount for a larger or smaller quantity. From 1 pint to 1 quart is enough for a large tree. All that is needed is a few drops scattered on the outside leaves of the tree for the fly to feed upon.

If too much spray is used it makes the eating of the fruit somewhat dangerous. The spray should be repeated at the end of the first week and again one week later. Meanwhile, if it rains to wash the spray off or dilute the mixture, the spray should be repeated as soon as the rain is over. The object is to have some of the poison bait present on the trees for the next three weeks for the flies to feed upon. Other trees close to the cherry trees should also be baited with the same material.

Former Gresham Man Shot.

Lyon P. Chiene, a former resident of Gresham, was found dead Thursday night in the American Laundry garage building, E. Third and Irving streets. An inquest was held, but it was unable to determine whether death was suicidal or accidental. The man met his death by the discharge of a pistol in his own hands in a manner undetermined, according to the jury at the inquest conducted by the county coroner, Dr. Earl Smith. Missed during the afternoon, Chiene, a laundry employe, was found several hours later by the engineer of the laundry plant and one of the proprietors.
