It is a well known fact that Oregon is not very well advertised to the rest of the world nor is the state well known to its own residents in general. The spirit of advertising has not been rife in Oregon. Yet Oregon has much to advertise. As its marvelous scenery is made accessible it should be advertised.

But Oregon manufactures and products need advertising as well. People are urged to buy Oregon-made goods and are too often unfamiliar with the name and claims of said goods.

A book has been published by the Oregon Manufacturers association, edited by Dan C. Freeman, which will help to overcome this handicap of Oregon manufactured products.

The book makes a splendid showing and all the state has been covered. The preface declares that the book has been published "with the definite purpose of securing additional market outlets for the products of the Oregon country."

The contents include classifications of commodities, an alphabetical list and personnel of industrial firms; a geographical section giving the industries by towns, together with population, etc.; a section of trade names and trademarks for quick reference; a list of cooperative associations in Oregon, as well as much other miscellaneous information.

Skeleton maps illustrate the comparative area of the Columbia Basin trade territory in comparison with other groups of states; the area of Oregon compared with other states, and there are graphs illustrative of the advantages of Portland as the great central market and seaport of the Pacific northwest.

The book will be placed in the libraries and the high schools of the state for reference purposes, and is also to be distributed among foreign consuls.

The book represents over ten months of labor of compilation. Many Oregon products are not well advertised, and the Oregon Manufacturers association has done the state a useful service in thus making known its manufactured goods.

WONDERFUL SCIENCE.

Diabetes, that kills men, begins by destroying the pancreas. Professor Bensley of Chicago University has succeeded in destroying and then restoring the pancreas of a rabbit.

Diabetes has been successfully fought, recently, by the use of insulin, a pancreatic extract. Now science, knowing that the pancreas after severe injury can restore itself by growing new tissues, as certain lizards grow a new tail, hopes to fight diabetes in a new way.

All this will shock and disturb those who believe that there is no such thing as disease, and that all you need do is to deny its reality. But it may cure diabetes, that kills millions and can't be helped by amiable theorizing. And that is the important thing.

WORLD WAR WAS AWFUL, BUT—

We stand aghast, and with reason, when we consider that in the World War 50,654 American soldiers were killed in action or died of wounds, and that 198,959 men received injuries.

But, remarks an editorial in the June issue of Sunset Magazine, in 1923, 18,788 people were killed in automobile accidents in the U. S. A., and preliminary figures for 1924 indicate that the casualty list for auto accidents for that year will be more than 20,000 killed and 400,000 injured.

That's quite some record. Taking the casualty list as a whole, we have on our hands something that is more ghastly than war. The war finally came to an end, contrary to the expectations of the A. E. F., but this automobile slaughter never ends. Each year it gets worse.

What are we going to do about it? Well, for one thing, we might have uniform traffic laws and enforce them. We might have tests for drivers; annual affairs, perhaps, designed to separate incompetents from their steering wheels. We might have monthly inspections of machines to see that they can be stopped if necessary. We might have fewer fines and more jail sentences for dangerous driving, we might each of us try driving a little more carefully.

IN THE COURSE OF TIME.

In motion pictures we saw the first pictures of Mauna Loa's latest great eruption. Smoke and flame rise slowly from flowing fields of lava that soon harden into smooth and apparently hopeless rock.

Men now living will never see anything from there, and the ancients, of course, thought that land thus formed was cursed forever. But time and the weather break up the rock, earth forms slowly through the centuries. The earth worms do their marvelous work, grinding up the soil into tiny particles, producing fertility. Plants and grass grow. Cattle eat the grass, man eats the ox instead of wasting time digesting plants. He writes a good book and humanity moves a little farther upward—thanks to the old volcano, throwing up fertilizing treasure from inside the earth.
