## LAST RITES SAID OVER REMAINS OF JOHN BROWN

Sympathizing friends and neighbors filled the Methodist Episcopal church Wriday afternoon to pay their last marks of respect to the memory of John Brown who died Wednesday morning, June 2, at Good Samaritan hospital from paralysis following an nearly every prominent business man in Gresham was present at the funeral. Many beautiful floral pieces were in evidence as tokens of the esteem in which the deceased was held. A auartet composed of C. E. Rusher Leslie Walrad, Mrs. E. W. Aylsworth and Miss Martha Hagberg, sang, with Miss Amy Cooper at the piano, also Miss Hagberg rendered a solo, "The End of the Road." The Rev. E. G. Judd spoke from the text, "I am the Light of the World." The pallbearers, all members of the Modern Woodmen lodge, of which Mr. Brown was a member, were A. W. Metzger, C. J. Lundquist, Alfred Hammar, C. H. Lane, B. L. Walrad and Fred Fieldhouse.

John Brown was born at Molesworth, Ontario, Canada, May 19, 1867. At the age of 19 he moved to Oregon with his parents and settled near Lexington. While spending two years at Medical Lake and Spokane, Washington, he learned the carpenter's trade He then moved to Rockwood, Oregon. and on September 26, 1894, was married to Miss Minnie A. Smith, of Portland. Five children were born to this union, all of whom, with Mrs. Brown, survive, Mrs. Miriam Adkins, of Heppner, Oregon; Ross, of Gresham; Frank, of Seattle; Walter of Los Angeles, and Charles, of Powers, Oregon. All were present at the funeral with the exception of the son in California. Other survivors are a sister, Mrs. Allison May, of Portland, and three brothers, James, of Seattle; David, of Livingston, California and George, of Vancouver, B. C. Mr. Brown followed the carpenter and contracting business for several years and was engaged in the mercantile business at Rockwood for seven years and while thus engaged was largely instrumental in organizing the Rockwood school district and the Maccabee and Odd Fellow lodges. Before leaving Rockwood he started in the insurance and real estate business and upon moving to Gresham in June, 1911, opened an office and continued in that business until his last illness. Judge Brown was justice of the peace for seven years for Multnomah district, serving the county lying east of Portland. During all the years of Mr. Brown's business career he never became hard hearted or indifferent to the feelings and needs of others. He was generous almost to a fault. He never complained about his own troubles and sufferings. He loaned and gave away money to friends and strangers, often without making any record of what he had done. Because of his long residence in Gresham and his kindly and benevolent attitude to all with whom he came in contact, he was one of the most widely known citizens of Gresham and his presence in the accustomed place of business will be missed by hundreds of people throughout this district. A. E. Hill, editor of the "Montavilla Times," paid a beautiful tribute to Mr. Brown through the columns of his paper, in the following words: "The editor of the Montavilla Times numbered John as one of his close personal friends and it is with deep sorrow that we chronicle his taking away. In our associations with him in a social way during our stay of the greater part of four years in Gresham we had learned to regard Mr. Brown as a lover of his fellowmen. A big, generous- hearted fellow, he would neglect his own business to assist some one else. John will be missed by a host of friends, as he has been a prominent citizen of Multnomah county
