

The Semi-Centennial Celebration

The University of Oregon is planning to celebrate the semi-centennial anniversary of its founding (1876-1926) this fall from October 18 to 23. A special feature of the celebration will be the inauguration of the new president, Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall.

The history of the university and its accomplishments in the fifty years of its life will be told in song and story. Several of the foremost men in university education in the United States will appear on the program. The schools or departments of the university's work will be represented in special programs, one of which will be devoted to adult education.

Definite plans for this latter program have not yet been completed, but the extension division is already very sure of one thing: we want just as many extension students—

both class and correspondence study—as can possibly come. The program for the entire week will be full of interest for those who can attend for the full time, but the effort will be to make the program on adult education of particular interest to extension folk.

Wherefore, extension students and friends are asked to bear in mind this event in planning their vacation. Further details will be announced through the press during the summer and also in the university's pamphlets. The entire celebration will be a significant event in the university's history and it is hoped that a large number of students, alumni and friends can be present.

Anthony Hengstler has purchased a new Chevrolet sedan of the landeau type through the local agency of W. W. Metzger.

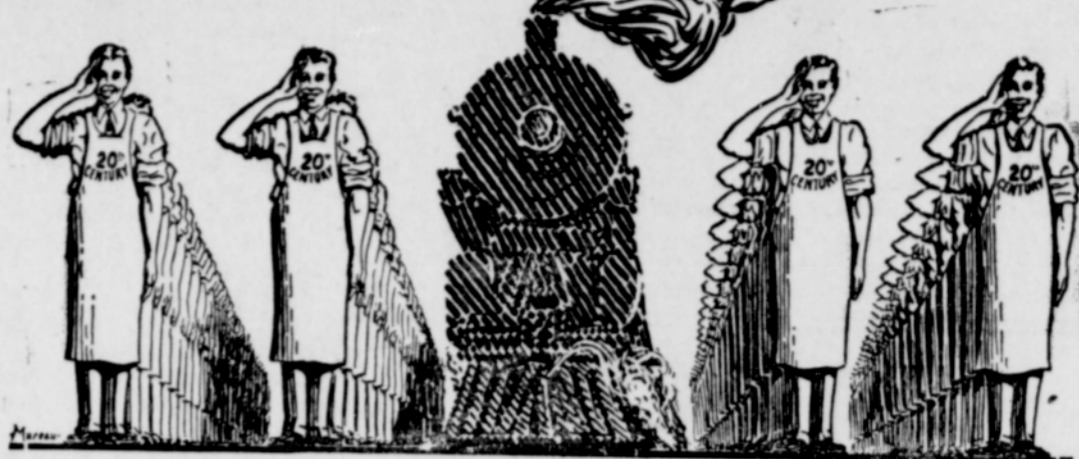
