

**HILLSVIEW WOMAN DIES FUNERAL HELD THURSDAY**

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon for Mrs. Della E. Kendrick who died at her home in Sunshine valley south of the Hillsview schoolhouse on the afternoon of July 5. The services took place at the chapel of the Gresham Funeral parlors and were conducted by the Rev. E. G. Judd. Interment was made in Mt. Scott cemetery.

Illinois, October 28, 1859. The family moved to Missouri in 1878 and on December 25, 1884, she was married to Thomas A. Kendrick, by whom she is survived, together with a son. They came to Oregon in 1903. Mrs. Kendrick was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church in Carthage, Missouri.

**SANDY OLD SETTLERS FORM PIONEER SOCIETY**

An organization to be known as the Pioneer and Early Settlers' society was effected at Sandy last Sunday at the conclusion of a chicken dinner served to 40 friends and relatives of Mr. and Mrs. John Revenue, the occasion being in honor of the 70th birthday of Mr. Revenue. He was the first white child to be born at Sandy. The dinner was served on the Revenue lawn and at its close, while engaged in the exchange of reminiscences, it was suggested that the society be formed, A. W. Cooke, pioneer of '55, serving as chairman. John Revenue was chosen president; A. W. Cooke, vice president; Ed. F. Burns, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. Emma Bennett Miller, historian; Mrs. Robert Jonsrud, chairman of a committee to draft a constitution and by-laws.

The next meeting of the society will be held at the Jonsrud grove on the Bluff road near Sandy, Sunday, July 25, at noon. All pioneers and old settlers of this section, their descendants and others interested, are invited to be present and Mr. and Mrs. Jonsrud will serve coffee. Mr. Revenue's parents took up a donation land claim of 320 acres near the Sandy river in 1853 and started a trading post. This post was the first stopping place this side of the Cascade mountains. The father, Francis Revenue, built the first bridge across the Sandy river; he was also instrumental in getting the first log schoolhouse built and hired the first teacher, Harvey Cross, who is now county judge in Clackamas county. Mr. Revenue was almost 96 years of age at the time of his death.

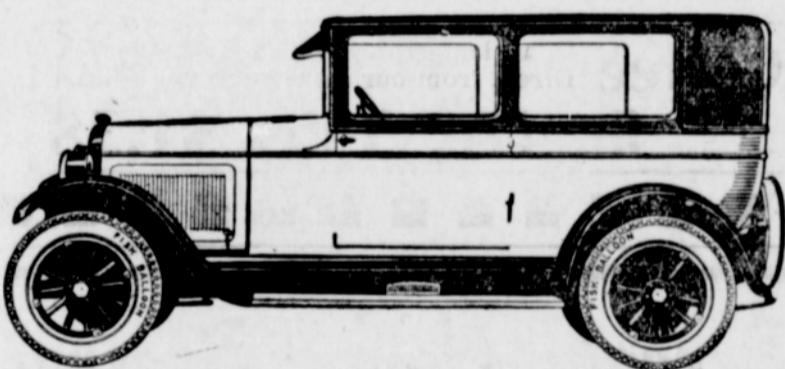
