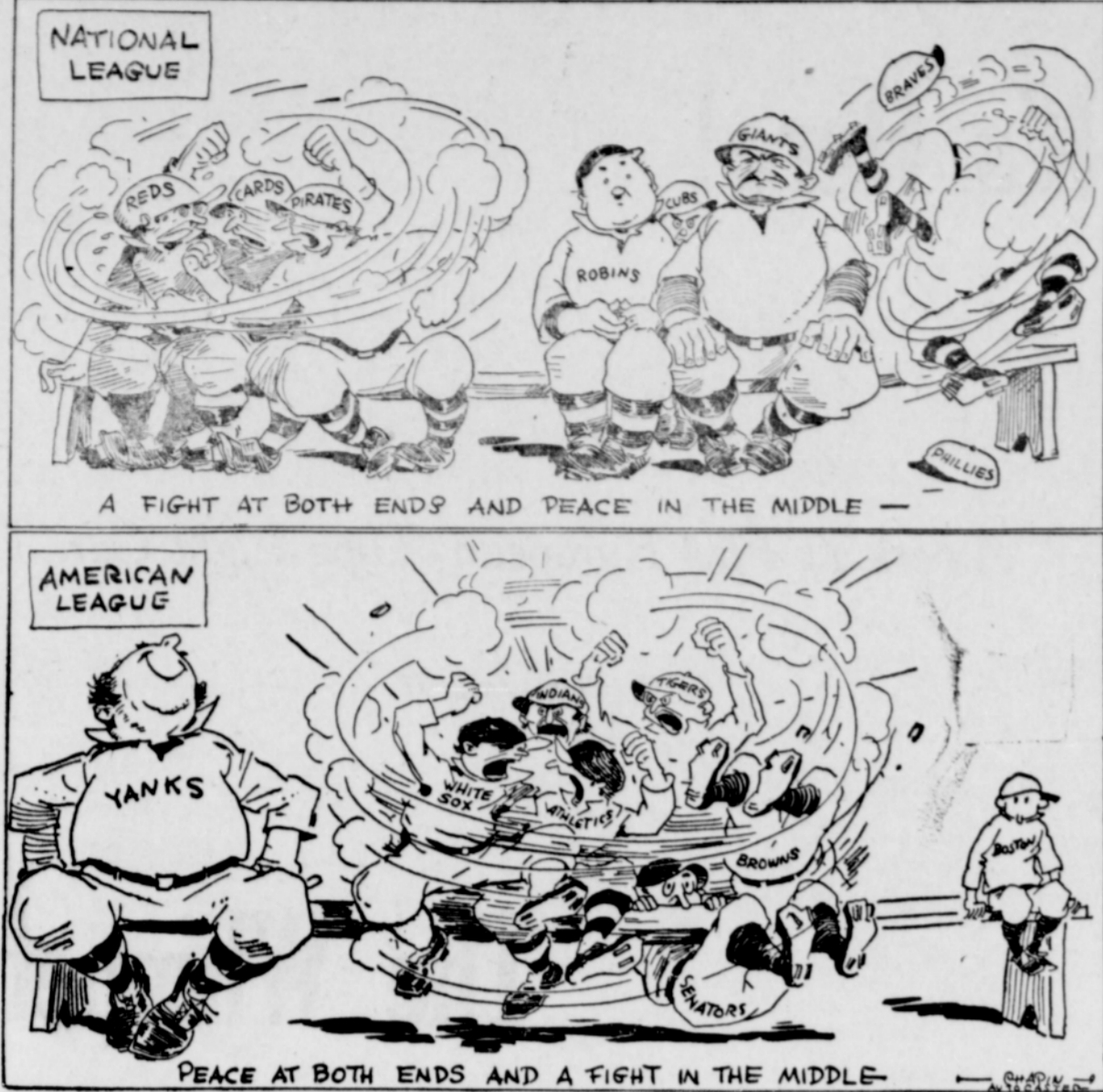


THE MID-SEASON BASEBALL SITUATION

ELECTRICAL POWER USEFUL ON FARMS

Many and varied are the uses to which electricity is being applied in these days of progress and invention. The farmer is becoming keen as to the possibilities of electricity as a time and labor saver, and as rapidly as their means will permit, they are installing appliances which can be run by electrical power. Not only are they installing the inventions of others, but many a farmer is a Yankee genius in the matter of inventing the answer to his own needs, and occasionally he rigs up a machine, electrically propelled, which answers his requirements and is a decided saver of money.

Daniel Meyers, a resident of the Cottrell neighborhood, is more than pleased with the chicken brooder these days of progress and invention, which he rigged up this spring to be run automatically. In April the brooder turned out 1600 chicks at a cost of one cent a chick for the electricity used for heating the brooder. This was accomplished at a minimum of labor and without the usual fire hazard with the old fashioned method of heating by stove or lamp. Mr. Meyers also has a motor attached to his farm pumps with a pressure tank and later he is planning to have all the machinery about the farm such as feed mill, fanning mill, emery wheel and cutters of various characters run with an electric motor attached to a line shaft.

Last year a prune dryer was constructed on a small scale by a resident of the Foster road rural district which operated to perfection. A box with shelving of screen and heated by means of an electric light bulb dried the prunes, which were pronounced of superior flavor. This same idea could well be worked out on a proportionately larger scale.

A late invention, not of Gresham neighborhood however, is a milk bottle sterilizer. This will prove a boon to dairymen when it has been adapted to their various needs and locations. Heretofore the bottles have been sterilized entirely by steam, but the new method does away with that.

When making new curtains it is a good plan to make the hems at top and bottom of equal width. This makes it possible to hang them upside down after a time, and they last much longer than they would if always hung one way.

Coal should be kept in a dry airy place. It will burn longer and make a brighter fire than when kept in a close cellar without ventilation.

Health Reminders

Science Provides a Definite Test for Scarlet Fever.

A bulletin was issued in January on Scarlet Fever, but on account of the steady increase as shown by our weekly reports, it is advisable to again warn the citizens of this state of the real seriousness of the disease. No matter how mild a case may be, the complications arising therefrom may be serious. Scarlet fever is increasing in this state as the following figures demonstrate:

1922, 568 cases, 21 deaths; 1923, 815 cases, 10 deaths; 1924, 1109 cases, 17 deaths; 1925, 1408 cases, 18 deaths; 1926, (4 months), 800 cases, 9 deaths.

There are many mild cases of scarlet fever that are never seen by the physician. There are other cases which are so mild that diagnosis is difficult. The mild case is a great factor in spreading the infection. The eruption of scarlet fever may in exceptional cases last only a few hours, while in others it may last 9 to 10 days. In still other cases the eruption becomes faint after the first day and later develops to the full extent. As in measles the eruption may in rare instances be abortive, being so faint as to escape observation. But even in these cases peeling is said to occur.

Scarlet fever is not easy to diagnose in the early stage of the disease. Even after the rash appears it is often difficult to distinguish it from the other eruptive diseases. The Schultz-Charlton Phenomenon or "blanching test" for scarlet fever is valuable in making a definite diagnosis where there is an eruption. This test consist of injecting one-tenth of a cubic centimeter of scarlet fever antitoxin in the upper layer of the reddened skin of suspected scarlet fever patients. In scarlet fever after six to eight hours a permanent blanching will take place around the sight of injection. The blanching may be a white ring surrounding a red area. It is better observed some distance from patient. Late rashes do not blanch as completely as early ones. There will be no blanching of the area following the injection of the antitoxin, if the patient's rash is not due to scarlet fever.

Scarlet fever is a very contagious disease although a certain per cent of children, and a still larger per cent of adults exposed will escape contract-

ing. Although one case may be mild, it is no sign that the next one who may get sick may not have a severe case. This disease is spread chiefly by contact between one who is susceptible and one who has the disease or is carrying the infection.

It is no longer necessary for children to have scarlet fever. The Dick test will determine which children are safe. If the child is found liable to contract scarlet fever, he can be immunized or vaccinated against the disease. After a vast amount of research work efficient means are at hand for the prevention of this disease. Every community can eradicate scarlet fever by being protected against it.
