For the first time, perhaps, in the history of Pleasant Valley, friends and neighbors have been called upon to pay the last sad tribute of respect to two young men on the same day.

Wm. E. Johnston and Alpha E. Oades, both ex-service men of the late world war, repose in their final rest beneath a profusion of flowers in beautiful Mt. Scott cemetery.

Funeral services for the late Wm. E. Johnston, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Johnston of Pleasant Valley, who passed away on July 7th at the Fitzsimmons General Hospital in Denver, were held on Tuesday afternoon of last week from the Miller & Tracy funeral home in Portland.

Mr. Johnston was born in Oregon City on August 17, 1893. He moved with his parents to Pleasant Valley, where he lived until 1918, when he was called to war, serving 22 months in the army.

Mr. Johnston was wounded in the Argonne Forest, from which he never fully recovered. Besides his parents he leaves to mourn his death three sisters, Mrs. Jennie McMillan of Warrenton, Mrs. Kate Jennings and Mrs. Maude Wright of Gresham.
