ELECTRICITY HELD BOON TO FARMERS

The uses to which electricity may be applied are so many and varied these days as to attract but cursory notice. One of the latest appliances on the farm in this locality to be connected up with electric current is a chicken brooder on the Daniel Meyers ranch about seven miles east of Gresham, in the Cottrell vicinity. Mr. Meyers, who is of an inventive turn of mind, constructed two brooders at a minimum cost. These were electrically heated and worked automatically and 1600 chicks were brooded in two months' time at a cost of \$16.

It is unnecessary to say that he is much pleased with the outcome of this experiment, so much so that he immediately gladdened the heart of his wife by installing a fine new electric range, ordered through the local branch of the Portland Electric Power company. Electricity on the farm is here and is here to stay. The farmer, of all people, with his long hours and rigorous toil, should be the first to take advantage of anything in the line of labor-saving devices. Grinders of all kinds, emery wheels, milk separators, and fanning mills can be run with a small motor attached to a line shaft. An electrically-driven milking machine is now no longer a curiosity on the large dairy farm. In the matter of the electric brooders which have been so successfully operated during the past few weeks on the Meyers ranch, two distinct advantages are apparent, the cheapness of their operation and the comparative or almost entire safety. If the wire is properly run and the connections made correctly, no damage can ensue from fires, so many cases of which have been cited this season throughout the country from explosions of kerosene lamps placed in brooders.

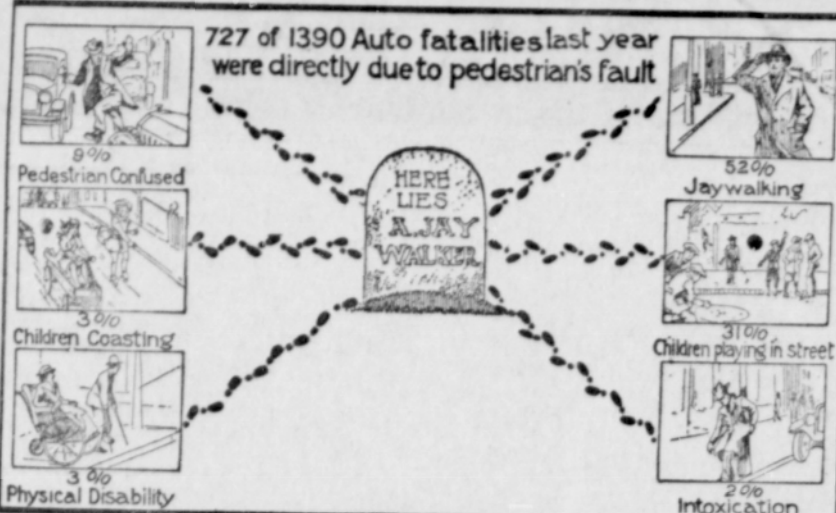

Jay Walker to Blame for Half of the Deaths by Auto



MANY a motorist whose car has figured in a fatal accident will be able to present a clear sheet to Saint Peter when his time comes, when one considers all the contributing factors outside of the driver's own fault. A total of 1,390 auto fatalities on record with the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents, covering a period of seven months, shows that in 727 cases the fault was clearly the pedestrian's and cannot be put down to the driver, the weather or unavoidable circumstances. The careless pedestrian's footsteps lead him to the grave by six distinct routes, says the Safety Council, and the most travel-worn of these is jaywalking. Sixty-two per cent of the 727 auto fatalities just referred to were due to streaking across busy streets without using the intersections. Children's playing in the streets was responsible for 31 per cent and coasting for another 3 per cent. Confusion on the part of the pedestrian, not hearing whistles and turning back in his tracks, brought about 9 per cent of these 727 deaths, while physical disability and intoxication rate 3 and 2 per cent respectively.

SERVICE STATIONS ADVISE TOURISTS

With many motorists in this city preparing for automobile tours, Kaser Service Station, of Gresham, Oregon, Firestone Dealers, today gave out instructions on the care of tires and the materials that should be carried for emergency use.

"Nothing can do more to mar an automobile tour, especially if it is of long duration, than frequent engine or tire trouble. The first thought of the motorist contemplating a tour should be that his engine and his tires are in proper condition," he said.

"Badly worn casings should be replaced with new ones. If a used tire is to be carried as a spare, the motorist should have a fireman carefully examine it to see that it is in good condition and any repairs necessary should be made before the trip is started.

"A complete emergency kit should be carried, in case of trouble on the road, far from a service station. There should be included in this kit an extra tube or two, one extra tire flap, one can of mica, three blowout patches, one box of friction tape, one tube of dry patching cement, one can of cure cut, three tire saver patches, one can of holdfast patch stock, one pair of scissors and three or four valves.

"With this equipment the motorist is prepared to make temporary tube repairs, and to care for a blowout, valve leaks and outside tread injuries. These repairs mean a material saving in time as well as tire costs.

"Tourists, too, should recognize the importance of checking the air in their tires at least every 500 miles. Continuous traveling over hot roads causes the air to leave the tires quicker."
