ROBERT T. LINCOLN.

There is a touch of pathos in the announcement of the death last Monday of Robert T. Lincoln, eldest son of Abraham Lincoln, and the last member of the great emancipator's immediate family. He was nearly 83 years old, and the eldest of five children.

He served under General Grant at the close of the civil war and was present at the surrender of Lee on April 9, 1865. He hastened to Washington with details of the surrender and on April 14 was present with his father in Ford's theater when the fatal shot was fired which gave this country its first martyr president.

He was secretary of war under Garfield whom he saw shot by the assassin on July 2, 1881. Lincoln was also near McKinley at the Buffalo exposition in 1901 when the latter was shot on September 6.

He was a stalwart and capable man, though retiring in his nature and with him passes a sort of last visible link binding the heart of a nation to one it had loved but lost from sight. The name is redolent with grateful memories to the American people.

S. P. TO OPEN NEW LINE ON AUGUST 20 Trains carrying delegations from Portland, Klamath Falls, Sacramento and San Francisco, business and industrial organizations, to the "Trail-to-Rail" celebration will be the first to operate over the Southern Pacific's new 280 mile Cascade route. This was announced in a special wire to the Trail-to-Rail association from J. H. Dyer, general manager at San Francisco. The event will unite eastern and western Oregon long separated by the Cascades barrier.

Though the regular local train service over the new line will not begin until about September 4, the railroad has arranged to run the first trains as specials August 19-20. Following the two-day program and pageant at Eugene they will travel over the new route to Klamath Falls. It is expected that more than 2,000 people will make the first trip which will carry them over the Cascades to the southern Oregon city.

Additional working crews have been scattered along the line on the Oakridge section in order to expedite completion of the job. There are over 1,500 men at work. It was also announced that the railroad would offer one-half fare from Oregon points to the celebration. Construction of a huge stage is now under way at the university athletic field at Eugene for the production of the pageant Klatawa.

The picnic held in Robert Jonsrud's grove by the Pioneers' and Early Settlers' society of Sandy and vicinity last Sunday was attended by about 150 people who thoroughly enjoyed the occasion. At noon a bountiful basket dinner was served, cafeteria style. John H. Revenue, president of the society presided at the afternoon meeting and gave a brief history of the main events of the early days. His father, the late Francis Revenue established the first trading post in this section on the Old Oregon Trail, and John Revenue was the first white child born at Sandy. Other speakers who gave interesting reminiscences and anecdotes of the early days were, Ed. Bruns, Robert Jonsrud, Louis Vaeretti, B. Nelson, A. C. Thomas, Mrs. Alice Gibbons and Mrs. Mary Bacon. Mrs. Allen of Portland, a member of the Willamette Chapter Daughters of American Revolution, also spoke. Prominent pioneers present were Penumbra Kelly and Mrs. Sarah Redford of Portland, the latter the first white child born in Vancouver, Washington. A committee consisting of Ed. Bruns, Robert Jonsrud and Mrs. J. M. C. Miller was appointed to confer with the D. A. R. chapter concerning a marker for the Martin Peterson grave. The next meeting of the society will be held in January next year.
