A 100-foot extension is being built on the loading shed along the O. W. R. & N. track to accommodate the increased shipments of cauliflower, cabbage and celery. As an extension to the same building, and under the same roof, a small cold storage plant is being built by the Northwestern Ice & Cold Storage company of Portland. An ice machine will be installed, not for the purpose of manufacturing ice but to keep the room cold, and arrangements will be made to care for seven or eight carloads of produce at a time. The building, which is of wooden construction, will be ready in about a month.

cial canners, who have never loved the movement, but who have learned to respect the organization and appreciate the service rendered in producing a superior quality of product which is very gratifying to say the least.

"There has also been some local opposition to the enterprise expressed by local business interests who apparently, judging others by themselves, could not conceive of men and women working industriously and unselfishly for the good of all. This has been a sinister influence that has worked through all the years to arouse suspicion and prevent some "doubting Thomas" growers from joining the association and has encouraged the commercial interests to hope, that by attacking from without and trying to create dissension within, to break down the association. However after six years of effort toward the building of a one-million-dollar industry that has not cost the business interests a berry, can we not hope to have their friendly cooperation to the extent of saying a kind word in approval of a major community enterprise?"

"In closing we wish to thank all those who have said a kind word and those referred to above who will, we promise and express on behalf of 550 members the sentiment that all is forgiven and that we may all have a good time at the Multnomah county fair and all work together for the building of a happy prosperous community."

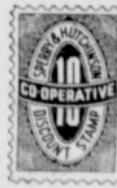

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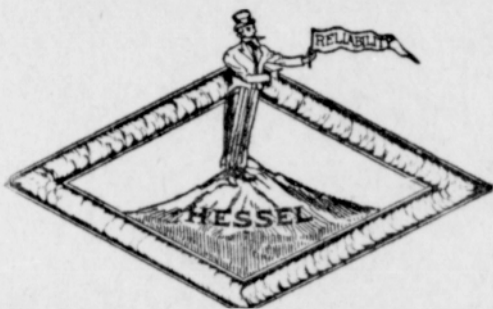
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Bourne were luncheon guests Wednesday of Mrs. Joe Dunne in Portland.
