"A Study in Scarlet"

An automobile, driven at a moderate, reasonable rate, is a source of comfort, convenience and pleasure. The same car, speeded up to the danger point, becomes menace to its driver, its occupants and to the public.

Study of automobile accidents shows that dire disaster attends the careless motorist and that Death's pallid hand forever is at the steering wheel, watchful, eager, alert. Only when motorists learn to give closer attention to the operation of their cars will the scarlet record of the Grim Reaper be shortened.

If there were a traffic officer to every mile of highway in the nation automobile accidents would continue as long as drivers are reckless, careless and thoughtless.

Our roads are ideal for motoring but they are not speedways. There must be hills and curves and points of danger to the unwary, the careless. Even on straight, clear stretches any one of a thousand things can happen to hurl the speeding automobilist into eternity.

The motorist ought to think of others. When he is tempted to risk his own life he owes it to humanity to remember that he has no right to endanger the lives and safety of other people.

The "Speed Demon" is as dangerous as the homicidal maniac and an even greater menace for his potential for spreading death and disaster is far higher.

When the traffic officer's screaming siren has brought you to a halt and he gravely asks: "What's your hurry?" why not give the question more than passing thought? Is there occasion for breaking the speed laws? Is it worth while to risk your own life and the lives of others, that a few paltry minutes may be saved? Is it not better to arrive safely at your destination than never to reach it at all?

It is good to reflect that all the driving skill, all the experience to be gathered in years of motoring, will avail nothing at times. Careful attention to the operation of a car and close observance of the motor laws are the best insurance against accident.

She had been a patient sufferer for many years. Mrs. Anderson was born in Sweden July 19, 1866, and came to this country when but 13 years of age. She is survived by her husband, A. W. Anderson, three sons, Harvey, of Gresham, and Ernest J. and Archie W., of Portland, also a daughter, Mrs. J. V. Belleu, of Portland. The funeral services are to be held at the Saron Lutheran church.

Taking the Drudgery Out of Life.

Electricity, since the building of Edison's first central station, has reconstructed mankind's whole scheme of existence. The United States has the best electric service in the world, and makes the widest use of it. It is being constantly improved and as electric and gas appliances are more widely used in the home, our standards of living advance, household work becomes easier and the American wife and mother has more time to devote to study and her children.

When we hear a lot about the wonders of the past, at a period when the family washing required two days of hard labor, when the old wood stove or coal furnace kept someone busy shoveling in fuel and carrying out ashes, when the lamps had to be filled and cleaned every day, toasts made over hot coals which scorched one's face, hot water for a bath heated in a tea kettle or a wash boiler and the curling iron covered with soot in a coal oil lamp, it is time to be thankful for the conveniences which electricity and gas have put into the modern home.

Government data from several thousand farms in this country shows that the value of the family living from the farm at farm prices is approximately one-third of the cost of living of farm families, and two-thirds of the cost of food, fuel, and house rent. It is one-ninth as much as the farm receipts and one-third as much as the farm income.

Tomatoes fresh, raw, or canned are a good source of vitamins A and C. This is the reason that child specialists often recommend that young children and sometimes babies be given tomato juice. It is a good plan also to include tomatoes often in the family menu.

NOTICE OF SALE.

\$600,000 Multnomah County, Oregon, Ross Island Bridge Bonds, Series C.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of County Commissioners of Multnomah County, Oregon, will receive sealed bids for an issue of coupon bonds for \$600,000, as follows: The rate of interest on the bonds shall be 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. The rate of interest which said bonds shall bear has not been specified, but each bidder who shall offer to buy said bonds must specify in his bid the rate of interest to be paid thereon, the bidder will be taken into consideration by the Board of County Commissioners in selling the bonds, and the Board of County Commissioners will determine the rate of interest to be paid.

These bonds shall be issued in denominations of \$1,000 each; principal and interest to be paid in gold coin, at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon, in New York City, N. Y., or at the office of the Treasurer of Multnomah County, Portland, Oregon, and said bonds will mature as follows: \$24,000 September 1st, 1926, and \$24,000 on the first day of September of each and every year thereafter until the principal of \$540,000 shall have been paid, to-wit: September 1st, 1936.

These bonds are issued for the purpose of raising funds to proceed with the construction of a bridge across the Willamette river in the City of Portland, Oregon.

A duly certified check, drawn on a responsible bank for five per cent of the amount of the bid, payable to Jos. W. Beveridge, County Clerk of Multnomah County, Oregon, shall be returned if the bid is not accepted, otherwise to be applied to the County Clerk. If the bidder fails to comply with the terms of the bid, said amount shall be forfeited to the County Clerk, and the bidder shall be liable for liquidated damages. Unconditional bids only will be considered. Bonds will be sold for cash at 100 per cent, less than par value and accrued interest will be considered. The bonds may be sold to the highest bidder, but the right is reserved to reject any and all bids.

All bonds which may be sold under this issue shall be sold for delivery at such bank at Portland, Oregon, as may be designated by the successful bidder. All bids must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the County Clerk. The successful bidder will be furnished with an unqualified and final opinion of the County Clerk, Palmer and Dodge, attorneys, of Boston, Massachusetts, approving the legality of the issue. All bids must be in the hands of the County Clerk of Multnomah County, Oregon, at Room 405 Multnomah County Building, Portland, Oregon, at 12 o'clock noon, Pacific time, August 22d, 1926, at which time and place the same will be opened and considered.
