CONTRACTS LET FOR COUNTY ROAD WORK

Among the road improvements which are to begin shortly throughout the county is the paving of the Section Line road from East 82d street to Gresham. A. D. Kern of Portland was successful in landing this neat little contract which calls for an expenditure of \$135,963. It is not definitely known just when the work will start on this road, but it is thought it will be inside of the next month.

Mr. Kern also proved to be the lowest bidder on the Cully road project, his bid amounting to \$29,267.50. County Roadmaster Buck made the announcement after the contract was awarded to Mr. Kern that the amount of rock for the shoulders for Cully road would be reduced so that the cost of the paving could be kept inside the appropriation of \$25,000. It is thought that gravel on the present road bed can be utilized for use in the shoulders.

The paving of the Foster road into Damascus has been completed recently, about a mile and a half in length, and paving of the Oregon City road into Damascus for about the same distance has also been finished this year. Another piece of Clackamas county roadway to be paved in 1926 is between Carver and Barton and this connects with 82d street at Clackamas station. The Foster road extends on from Damascus to Boring, but there seem to be no plans as yet to complete the paving further than Damascus for the present.

I. C. C. INVESTIGATES USE OF HIGHWAYS

The importance of Oregon and the northwest in the series of hearings just held by the Interstate Commerce commission to determine the extent of the highway transportation is shown graphically by the fact that Commissioner Clyde B. Aitchison and Examiner Leo Flynn were both assigned to the Portland hearing. All others of the 13 hearings will be held with one commissioner or examiner in charge, whereas two were assigned to the Portland hearing.

The first day's hearing on Saturday, August 7, was supposed to have been given over to the railroads, the second day to the Automotive Carriers and the third day to Shippers and other interested parties, but due to the fact that the railroads presented most of their material at the St. Paul hearing, the railroad presentation took but a very short time, and the Automotive Carriers were called within an hour after the hearing was opened on Saturday.

AUTOS AND CYCLES WILL RACE AT McMinnville
