"Jackie Strong did more than just being lost. He tore off the shell of convention and the common place and allowed us to peer for a moment into the finer emotions and characters of our neighbors.

"Unselfish, true and fine we found them, and I shall always treasure the glimpse of human nature which was in evidence during the search.

"My faith in humanity was renewed, and I am a better man for having seen my fellow men without the veneer of artificiality.
