Stumping Powder Coming.

The county agent's office is making up orders now for a carload of pyratol. Orders have begun to come in and the county agent, S. B. Hall, hopes to have enough to send off for the first car in about two weeks. As soon as the orders for the first car are completed, orders will be taken for the second car.

It usually takes from four to five weeks from the time the orders are sent away until the car arrives. Those who are interested in using powder before the first of the year should make special effort to place their orders within the next ten days or two weeks.

FAREWELL PLANNED FOR DR. AND MRS. JOHN UNIS

A farewell reception will be given at the Saron Lutheran church in Powell Valley next Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in honor of the departure of Dr. and Mrs. John Unis, who expect to sail for Peking, China, on the 7th of September.

Dr. Unis has undergone many years of intensive preparation for medical missionary work, and his field of activity will be in the mission field of the Augustana Synod of America located in the province of Honan, China. He and his wife plan to spend the next five years there.

Dr. Unis is a graduate of a theological seminary as well as of the medical department of the University of Oregon and has just completed a year's internship at the Seattle City hospital. Mrs. Unis is a trained nurse and has been employed by the Oregon Tuberculosis association in school health work.

The community feels itself honored in arranging for the reception of Wednesday evening and extends best wishes for a happy and safe journey also for success in their consecrated work as missionaries among the Chinese. It is indeed felt to be commendable when a young man and his wife are so devoted to the interest of missions that they will forego the lucrative callings of the medical and nursing professions for the comparatively unremunerative work in a foreign land.

Start the Day Right.

If you are going to breakfast your health, do not go breakfastless to work. It induces inefficiency and, in time, is harmful. To maintain good health, it is necessary to begin the day with a more or less substantial meal.

Why is it then that so many people slight breakfast? Lack of time in the morning is one excuse. No appetite is another. Not knowing what we should eat is a third, and a fourth is fear of being over-weight. A person who hasn't time for breakfast should change his hours of rest so as to allow plenty of time for this meal.

The question as to what constitutes a good breakfast should be determined somewhat by the activity of the individual and the time at which he is to have his next heavy meal. Those who have ample noon meals and are sedentary workers, may have very light breakfasts, such as fruit, some kind of breadstuff, such as toast, rolls, or muffins, and a beverage, coffee, cocoa or milk.

Other action included recommendations of engineers that the truck men investigate the use of six-wheel carriers.
