

SCHNEIDER RALLY
INTERESTS MANY

Attorney Clifford G. Schneider was given a very good send-off in his campaign for district attorney at a mass meeting Wednesday night in Gresham which was attended by many townspeople and some from nearby localities. Members of the local Schneider-for-District-Attorney committee were much in evidence. The chairman of the committee, D. M. Roberts, president and J. Ross Brown, recently chosen secretary, acted in that capacity. Mr. Brown was also selected as treasurer of the committee.

Mrs. Lulu Horning, Judge Ashby C. Dixon and the nominee himself, C. G. Schneider, were the principal speakers. Remarks commendatory to Mr. Schneider were made by others. Subscriptions to the campaign fund were taken.

Mrs. Horning, president of the county W.C.T.U., said she did not speak as a representative of the body of women of which she was the county leader but only as an individual. Yet she was sure she could speak the sentiments of many women of her acquaintance. The W.C.T.U. did not endorse any candidates but it was a part of their plan to investigate candidates and bring out the facts regarding their attitude toward law enforcement.

Mrs. Horning said she was very favorably impressed with Mr. Schneider and was glad to recommend him as the kind of a man needed in the county prosecutor's office.

Judge Dixon spoke at some length of his acquaintance with "Cliff" Schneider, his association with him as a member of the bar and his firm conviction as to his qualifications for the office of district attorney. He paid him a glowing tribute as a man of sterling character and a lawyer of high ideals and marked ability. He spoke of the needs of the district attorney's office and presented reasons for placing Schneider at the prosecutor's table.

He said 46 per cent of the state's legal business was in Multnomah county. Nearly half of circuit judges of the state were in this county. The duty of this district attorney was to protect the civil interests and rights of the county and prosecute the criminal cases that arose. With "Cliff" Schneider in the office these duties would be performed fearlessly and faithfully.

Mr. Schneider declared what would be his policies of office, if elected, refuted any rumors that he might withdraw, said he was in the field to stay and if his name did not appear on the ballot it would be because it appeared in his obituary first.

While the audience was not large it was representative and enthusiastic and included men and women of both political parties.

Mrs. Franklyn R. Brazear, of Portland, Mr. Schneider's organizer, a well known community worker and club woman, was present and told of the plans of the general campaign committee to organize community committees in 40 or more locations in the county as has been done in Gresham, this being the first. The second local club has been started in the Woodlawn district where a rally will be held next Wednesday night.

It was decided to hold another rally in Gresham on Wednesday night, September 15.

All local supporters of Clifford G. Schneider are requested to contribute as liberally as possible to his campaign fund, as the financial support given must be the barometer of interest taken and while the campaign will be handled economically there are many necessary expenses. Two birthdays of celebrated Gresham people have been recognized this week by fitting notice for a few moments from the busy fleet of time. One was that of Master Jackie Strong who on Tuesday, August 31, was eight years of age and the other was of "Grandma" Linnemann, who passed the 98th milestone of her life on Wednesday, September 1. The one is just beginning life, one that promises to be more or less adventurous in its character, and the other is slowly rounding out an eventful and useful career and is lying at her home peacefully awaiting the final summons into the unknown.

Mrs. Catherine Elizabeth Linnemann was born in Hanover, Germany, in 1828. At the age of 23 she was married to John G. D. Linnemann and the following year they crossed the plains by ox-team and settled in Portland. He opened a tailor shop but later they purchased a land claim of several hundred acres on the Powell Valley road near the present site of Linnemann station, which was named in honor of them. The death of her husband occurred in 1892 and since that time until hindered by poor health Mrs. Linnemann has been actively engaged in home and community affairs. Her daughter, Mrs. Ione McColl, who cares for her untiringly, says her mother is a trifle weaker than a few weeks ago and she can see she is gradually failing. Mrs. Linnemann apparently was unaware of the interest taken in her birthday on Wednesday and insisted that it was Dr. Huett, one of her callers, who was enjoying that distinction. CAR HITS TRUCK;
MOTORMAN HURT

A collision between a two-car electric train of the P. E. P. company and a heavily loaded lumber truck occurred near Boring last night about 6 o'clock, which resulted in wrecking the vestibule of the car and injuring the motorman. This constituted the greatest damage, but in addition the truck had one wheel damaged and the driver, A. W. Shipley of Gresham, suffered slight scalp wounds. His load was scattered in all directions. Motorman Van Ham, a veteran in the service of the company, was squeezed into a small space by the impact of the car on the load of lumber. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital by an ambulance, where the extent of his injuries have not yet been determined.

The accident occurred just west of the Boring depot. The approach to the track was up grade and over a bridge, and the truck was traveling slowly in second gear. The electric train had rounded a curve about 600 feet from the crossing and was approaching the truck from the driver's right, thus cutting down his range of vision by the width of the cab. When the truck was fairly on the track Mr. Shipley saw the train bearing down on him within a car's length, and applied all possible gas. The rear wheels of his truck had just cleared the track when the crash came.

The train was one which does not stop at Boring and hence was not slowing down for the station.

Mr. Shipley, who has had many years' experience in driving trucks and touring cars, says this is the first time he has had the slightest traffic accident.

Fair Board Plans Improvement.

A fair board meeting was held last night in the city hall at which a few left over bills were allowed and the affairs of the 1926 fair about finished up. Secretary A. W. Metzger was not prepared to give a complete statement of the finances but would be ready soon. Several members recently visited the southwest Washington fair at Chehalis and told of some of the features which they thought worthy of emulation. There was also some discussion as to improvements in the auto parking and arrangements of grounds but no definite recommendations could be made until the financial report is complete. The board adjourned to meet Thursday night, the 16th. Next Saturday afternoon at 2 members of the board will meet at the fair entrance to decide on matters pertaining to the graveling of the driveways. It is hoped to have this work done this fall so that the covering will be well settled and in first-class condition another year.

Changes in Creamery Plant.

Some important changes are taking place at the plant of the Rose Maid creamery. B. I. Russell has severed his connection with the company and will devote his time to other interests in Portland. W. A. Baughman is in Gresham from Great Falls, Montana, and is looking over the situation with a view to becoming permanently interested here if the creamery proposition here looks favorable. Mr. Baughman has spent years in this line of work and is thoroughly conversant with all phases of the creamery situation. P. W. Weaver and son who were employed in various capacities at the creamery during the summer months have also returned to their home in Portland.

Aged Woman Dies at Boring.

Funeral services will be held Saturday, September 4, at 2 p. m. from the Kenworthy funeral parlors in Sellwood for Mrs. Julia Stoessel, aged 73 years, who passed away at her home in Boring, August 31. She is survived by a daughter in Boring, Mrs. William Jocelyn, also two daughters in Portland, Mrs. Josie Thomas and Mrs. Nellie Karr. Interment will be made in the Mt. Scott cemetery. The remains were taken in charge by the Gresham Funeral parlors and afterward consigned to the funeral parlor of Walter C. Kenworthy in Portland, in accordance with the last request of the deceased.
