PROPERTY OWNER SEEKS DAMAGES FOR LAND

When J. N. Clananah returned from a summer's trip to Scotland a short time ago he was much surprised to learn that the county commissioners had confiscated about \$1,000 worth of real estate belonging to him during his absence, in connection with the obtaining of the right of way for the proposed straightening of the Section Line road. Mr. Clananah has retained W. J. Cooper as his attorney, who will make an effort to reopen the case and secure reimbursement from the county for land used without his consent. The matter was closed without his knowledge or without his having presented a claim for damages. One-half of the roadway across four lots was taken from his property by the county when condemnation proceedings were on for the straightening of the line incident to the paving. Other property holders were remunerated for their rights of way, but as Mr. Clananah was absent and no claims were filed, the matter was declared closed.

Oregon Normal Opens Sept. 27.

The fall term of the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth will open this year on September 27. All students entering for the first time will be in Monmouth Saturday, September 25 for their preliminary entrance examinations. A large enrollment is expected and school officials are busy during the vacation period making preparations for the fall opening. Records of the past year show an enrollment of approximately two thousand students with over seven hundred students graduating from the regular two year course and three hundred from the one-year course.

Certified Seed Urged for Growers.

Since only eight wheats—white winter, Eaton, Jenkin, Holland, Rink, Huston, Deffiance and Federation—are ever certified in western Oregon by the college extension service, buyers of certified seed for planting may be sure that any lot of any other variety grown here is not certified. If they buy any other kind they take their own chances on the purity of the variety and freedom from weed seed and disease which the college passes on in certified lots.
