THE STATE FAIR.

This is the week of the premier agricultural exhibition of the state, the state fair at Salem. All who can take a day off will plan to attend.

Oregon has enjoyed a prosperous season, there is activity and hopefulness everywhere, and these conditions are especially reflected in our annual fairs, county and state.

The best from all corners of the state may be seen at the state fair. The state fair has one advantage, over some others, that it doesn't need to worry over meeting expenses if the weather is unfavorable.

Almee Semple McPherson, whose hearing under an arrangement for obstructing justice and manufacturing false evidence in connection with her disappearance mystery is taking place in Los Angeles this week, calls District Attorney Keyes the "devil."

The passing of Judge Charles E. Wolverton is a distinct loss to the state and the nation. He was a good man, a distinguished citizen and a capable judge and his decisions reflected his character as a man and a worthy citizen.

IN HUMANITY TO MAN.
In the closing hours of its annual session held in Portland a few days ago, it is reported that the American Humane society passed a resolution recommending that all national forests be closed to all persons carrying fire arms so that the areas thus closed might become great game refuges.

It is a pity that an organization that has done so much for humanity by protecting humanity's dumb friends should, in a frenzy of zeal, launch itself upon an enterprise so foolish that it assaults the intelligence of every informed person, thus holding itself up to ridicule and seriously impairing its influence and usefulness.

In some of Oregon's counties as much as 75 per cent of the area is in the national forest and of the north-western states something in the neighborhood of 50 per cent is in the national domain.

Eliminate hunting (at least for large game) in the national forests of these states and you prohibit it all together. If that is the purpose of the American Humane society, why not present the issue fairly and ask for a constitutional amendment prohibiting the hunting or pursuing of fish or game anywhere and at any time?

Then, for the sake of consistency, let the maternal wing be extended to cover also all domestic animals and prohibit their slaughter for food or any other purpose.

Thus, it would seem, the purpose of the society would be achieved and man would be whining at the feet of the brute.

So long as there is carelessness or wanton cruelty inflicted upon dumb animals we venture to suggest to the society that it give its earnest attention to the subject, thus fulfilling the purpose of its existence.

This accomplished, we commend to its attention man's inhumanity to man. After that, will be time enough to look for new and strange worlds to conquer.

COUNTY QUIBBLES OVER PRICE OF LOOP TRACT

The Figure Eight on the Columbia river highway has become familiar to those who have traveled that road, and its wild beauty has charmed all who have seen it. Interest in the land adjoining it has been aroused lately on account of a controversy between the owners, Henry and Lizzie Latourell, and the county commissioners, over the price asked by the owners.

"The Figure Eight is one of the marvels of the Columbia river highway," said John B. Yeon, former county road master and one who had much to do with the building of the highway. "It should be reserved as a park so the people of the state and the tourists coming here can see what the primeval Oregon forest looked like."

Mr. and Mrs. Latourell have owned this land for many years and they gave the right of way for the Figure Eight. They feel that they are entitled to a reasonable price for the land, but what they consider reasonable is thought to be exorbitant by the county commissioners. The latter also have not available funds and have referred the matter to the park bureau of the city of Portland for consideration.

Karl J. Hagberg of Gresham has the exclusive right to sell 63 acres of Latourell land along the Figure Eight, and says that it must be sold and that if it is not acquired by the public it will be divided into smaller tracts and put on the market.

He has had an offer of \$1500 for one acre along the highway, but would sell the whole tract for \$650 an acre. He says that in 1916 three acres were sold adjoining this 63-acre tract at \$500 an acre, and that the tract was off from the highway and had no outlet to it. He bases his claim for the \$650 on the fact that the owners have paid taxes on the tract during the ten years since the \$500 an acre was paid, and that they have taken care of the property as a park should be cared for. Hagberg believes that the owners should get their taxes, interest on their money and a reasonable amount for caring for the land.

EMMETT RIEHL TAKES BRIDE FROM HOQUIAM

She is affiliated with the Delta Zeta sorority. Mr. and Mrs. Riehl expect to make their home in Gresham.

FUNERAL HELD FOR EMINENT JURIST

Impressive funeral services were held yesterday in Portland for the late Judge Charles E. Wolverton, who died suddenly Tuesday at Gearhart where he had gone with his wife for a brief vacation from the federal bench in Portland. The services were in the First Presbyterian church, and were largely attended by Judge Wolverton's associates in the legal profession and others. The Multnomah Bar association attended in a body. All branches of the federal service were represented, also the state bar association, the trustees of Reed College, the state circuit and district courts. Officers of the Masonic grand lodge were present and services at the grave were conducted by the Masonic order.

"The life which we are here to honor and revere," Dr. Bowman said, "has come to a triumphant close, as did the scripture selections which have been read. Our grief is touched with a sense of gratitude for the life which has passed. It was a life vigorous and winsome, strong and gentle, just and considerate and in a fine and noble sense a Christian life."

"It is just that a memorial should be built, but it should not be transient or material, but built in these lives of ours in the perpetuity of the things which we admired in him that we may come to the same beautiful conclusion."

Judge Wolverton was 75 years of age and had served as a federal judge in this district since 1905. Prior to this he was a member of the supreme court of the state since 1894, having been elected to this position after 20 years' practice of law at Albany, Oregon. He was native of Des Moines, Iowa, but was brought to Oregon by his parents when he was two years of age.

Bruce Wolverton, brother of the late judge and father of Mrs. Vera L. Tucker of Gresham, was born in the Oregon country while the family was en route to Polk county, where their home was established and where the children received their elementary education.
