#### NOTICE OF GENERAL ELECTION

Notice is hereby given, that the general city election for the City of Gresham, Oregon, will be held between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 8 o'clock p. m., Tuesday, November 2, 1926, at the regular polling places within the City of Gresham, Oregon.

That at said election the following officers for said City will be elected to fill the respective positions for the term of two (2) years, beginning January 1, 1927:

- One (1) Mayor.
- One (1) Treasurer.
- One (1) Recorder.
- One (1) Marshal.
- Three (3) Councilmen.

That at said election the following measures will be voted upon:

Authorizing the Council of the City of Gresham to levy an additional tax over and above the six per cent. limitation of not to exceed Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars per year for not more than ten (10) years and to thereby continue in force the special levy authorized by the special act of the year 1923 for the general expense of the City of Gresham. This will not increase the tax rate of the City of Gresham, but is a continuation of a special levy previously authorized.

Also, An Act, initiated by petition to amend Chapter 2, Section 2 of the Charter of the City of Gresham, to provide that the Marshal of the City of Gresham shall be appointed or removed by a majority vote of the Council, and not elected as by said Charter, now provided.
