

Troutdale Will Keep Its Woman Mayor

Evidently Troutdale has considerable faith in the ability of its women as the names of three of them appear on the ticket for the coming general municipal election next Tuesday. Mrs. Laura D. Harlow is slated to succeed herself as mayor of Troutdale for the coming term of two years, and has no opposition. She has served during her present term of office with acceptability. Mrs. Harlow is wide awake, a thorough booster for her town and keen to the live issues of the day. She is the second woman mayor of Troutdale. Mrs. Clara Larsson holding that office a few years ago and being the first woman mayor in the state of Oregon.

Isabella Waite is another woman on the ticket, being an aspirant for the office of the city treasurer. Ida Crawford is candidate for the office of councilman for a two-year term.

H. E. Boyd is out for re-election for city recorder. He is a man of

affairs and well in touch with the requirements of the office due to his position as cashier of the Troutdale State bank. Alvin C. Copeland and E. E. Billeter are running for city marshal. Three candidates must be selected from the four on the ticket for councilmen for the four-year term, John S. Burns, C. E. Scott, G. M. Haines and R. D. Hewitt. Mr. Hewitt is the principal of the Troutdale school.

The opponent of Ida Crawford for the two-year term of office for councilman is L. G. Howell.

FRED PROCTOR OUT FOR SANDY MAYOR

According to reports, Sandy, the thriving little municipality across the county line in Clackamas county, had some difficulty in selecting a candidate for the office of city mayor. W. A. Proctor, the present incumbent of that office, would not accept a second nomination owing to the press of personal business affairs, so the nomination was turned over to his son, Fred L. Proctor, cashier of the Clackamas County bank.

C. O. Duke and W. G. Duncan are up for re-election as city treasurer and recorder respectively. Four councilmen are to be elected out of the six aspirants for that office, Glen Loundree, Charles Sharnke, F. L. Christensen, A. W. Bell, Ezekiel Beers and William Updegrave. The marshal and water superintendent are appointed by the mayor.

LUTHERAN CHURCH TO HEAR NOTED SPEAKER
