VERSATILE JOE DUNNE.

The citizens of this and adjoining counties, and of the whole state, in fact, may be sure they have a safe aggressive law maker in State Senator Joe Dunne, elected from Multnomah, Clackamas and Columbia counties.

In the Gresham precincts he received a very complimentary vote, more than three to one of his democratic opponent. In Multnomah county as a whole he received two votes to one of his opponent.

Mr. Dunne is well known in eastern Multnomah, was for many years manager of the Weatherly Ice Cream company and is at present manager of the Coffee Cup restaurant in Portland. Auto Suggestions

Gathered from reliable sources to help you get the most service out of that car of yours.

Use of Shutters.

These cool autumn mornings and evenings motorists can obtain first-class performance and efficiency by making use of the heat of the motor itself, according to M. C. Webster, Hudson-Essex dealer. The result to be desired is to get the motor and motor compartment warm just as promptly as possible.

"When this warm temperature is reached," Mr. Webster states, "the efficiency of carburetion is much increased, and we obtain better performance and improved economy. Until the motor is warm the use of the choke is usually necessary—and it is well known that this is harmful to the life of the motor. To warm the motor promptly we recommend the use of the radiator shutters. By closing these shutters the motor compartment is kept warm from streaming through the radiator onto the motor. When this cold air is excluded the engine will quickly bring itself to an efficient temperature and the 'cold' period is reduced to a minimum.

"It is a mistake to think shutters are useful only in very cold weather. They are useful in all temperatures, and particularly when less than 60 degrees is registered. Because of their importance they have long been supplied as standard equipment on both the Hudson and Essex. A motorist is installed to enable the driver to keep his car at a consistently correct temperature.

"In driving into a cold wind, for instance, the driver will doubtless wish to close the shutters—which, by the way, will make it more comfortable for passengers in the front seats. It is also good practice, on cold days, to close the shutters entirely when stopping, thereby retaining and conserving as much heat as possible. On a long drive the motor will warm itself up to a point where the shutters should be at least partly open for efficient cooling. By keeping this consistent control of his motor the owner of a Hudson or Essex car is helping the performance and life of his automobile in highly important respects."

Mr. Webster said that local owners of the new Hudson Super-Sixes, with the improved carburetor and manifold, are reporting very satisfactory gasoline economy.
