The Epworth League is planning a party to be given in the social rooms of the Methodist church on Thursday evening, November 11, to which all young people are invited.

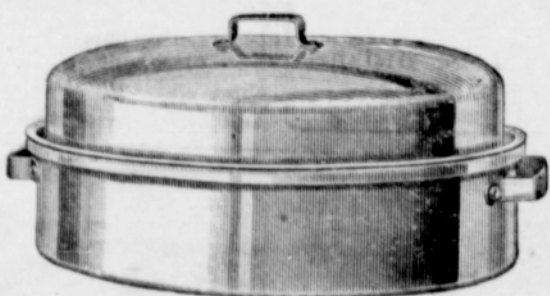

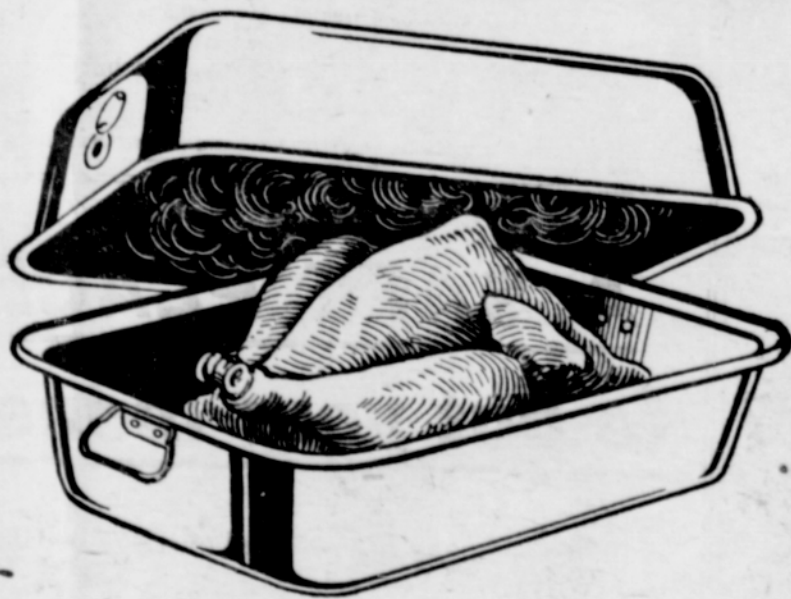

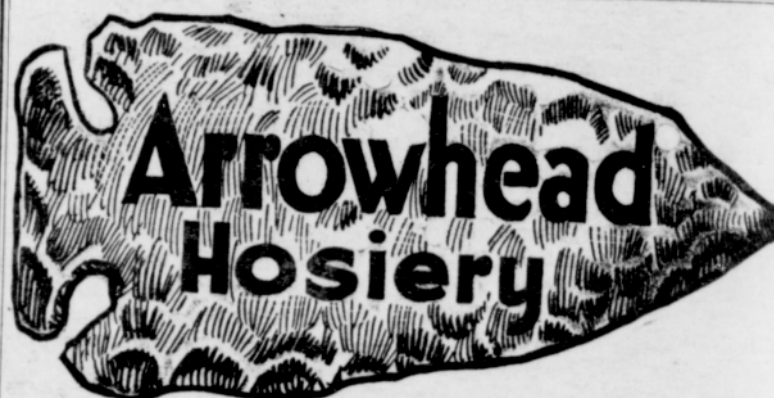
