

Former Corbett Man Makes Taft Famous

WING DAM PROJECT AT MOUTH OF SANDY

A project is soon to be undertaken to build a wing dam at the mouth of the Sandy river in order to force a channel through the bar, according to well founded reports.

When this is accomplished two important things are scheduled to happen. One will be the opening of a ferry line between Troutdale and Washougal which it is believed will accommodate many persons. The other is that fish will enter the Sandy and its old time prestige as a fishing stream will be restored.

C. T. Smith, of the firm of Smith & Herren, ferry-boat operators on the Columbia river, who are preparing to bid on the wing dam project at the mouth of the Sandy river, is reported to have told State Game Warden E. F. Averill, he expected to install a ferry service between Washougal, Washington, and Troutdale, if the new dam was successful in forcing a channel through the bar at the mouth of the Little Sandy.

Smith has been carrying foot-passengers by rowboat from Washougal to the Oregon side, usually landing them at Fairview, and most of the passengers have indicated that they would like to reach Troutdale, he said.

Many others have asked to be taken to Troutdale, and Smith believes that more than 20 passengers a day could be served if the Sandy river bar permitted of passage on the way to Troutdale.

In commenting on the anticipated change the Oregonian says editorially that the "diversion of the Sandy river to a new channel, at its mouth, seems now happily assured, after years of waiting; years that were plentiful in talk but poverty stricken in action. To Portland anglers this project is of major importance. It should mean the restoration of trout and salmon runs in a fine stream that had lost its heritage. If the new channel is deep enough, as there is every reason to believe that it will be, there will be such fishing in the Sandy as now is obtained only by visiting Washington rivers or our own coastal or mountain streams. There used to be such fishing in the Sandy, and it was made certain by the ease with which anadromous fish entered that tributary of the Columbia."
