

GRESHAM LOCALS

All stores and other places of business in Gresham will be closed for the observance of Thanksgiving day. The grocery stores will be open on Wednesday evening until a reasonable hour. The post-office will be closed all day Thursday, no rural delivery or general delivery taking place. There will be the usual holiday distribution of mail to boxholders.

Union church services will be held in the Baptist church beginning at 10 o'clock Thanksgiving morning and lasting an hour. The Rev. H. V. Wilhelm, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, will deliver the sermon.

NAMES AND PLACES.

It's rather interesting to pick up the Tillamook Headlight, newspaper, and read of the Fairview grange meeting and of the Pleasant Valley grange meeting. Our first thought was how and why did the Tillamook paper get the report of our local grange meetings. Further reading revealed names of speakers unfamiliar in Multnomah county and we infer that the familiar community names apply as appropriately to Tillamook county locations as to those we know so well here. Perhaps there are other Pleasant Homes, other Rockwood and other Springdales in Oregon. These names are all suggested by physical conditions which may be found elsewhere. Towns and localities named after persons are not so easily duplicated. It used to be customary to add the county to a mailing address, something rarely done now since the postal department forbids duplicate names of postoffices in a state. Fairview in Tillamook county was formerly a postoffice and the postoffice name for Fairview in Multnomah was Cleone. When the former was surrendered Cleone very properly became Fairview.
