White Ribbon Review Lauds Gresham Folks

The current number of White Ribbon Review, the official organ of the Oregon Woman's Christian Temperance Union, is largely taken up with reports of the convention held here in October. It expresses appreciation both in news stories and editorial, for the cordiality of the Gresham people and for the many favors shown to the officers and delegates.

"It was a big convention—191 delegates. "Little Gresham was equal to the emergency—because its soul was big." "Never did delegates receive so many 'free' things. Free newspapers, free fruit, free flowers, free automobile transportation, free programs—but the list is too long."

The following excerpts from the story of the convention give the general impression made on the visitors:

"With clear skies and sunshine, with air full of ozone, Gresham was resplendent in holiday array. Flags and banners waved. Nearly every window reflected a welcome by posters or suggestive decorations.

"In the convention church it was evident that the committee on decorations must have been a group of artists. A large post flag covered the front wall. To the east there were gracefully draped the flags of the nations. The credit of this display is due Mr. Geo. Honey.

"Over 300 sat down in comfort to the banquet, and were served with perfect efficiency.

"An automobile trip to Multnomah Falls was one of the many treats given the delegates by the Gresham citizens.

"All the state officers were re-elected except the corresponding secretary, who absolutely declined, being unable to serve longer. Each elected state officer was presented by the convention through Mrs. Horning, Multnomah county president, a beautiful token of appreciation for service through flowers, flowers and more flowers."

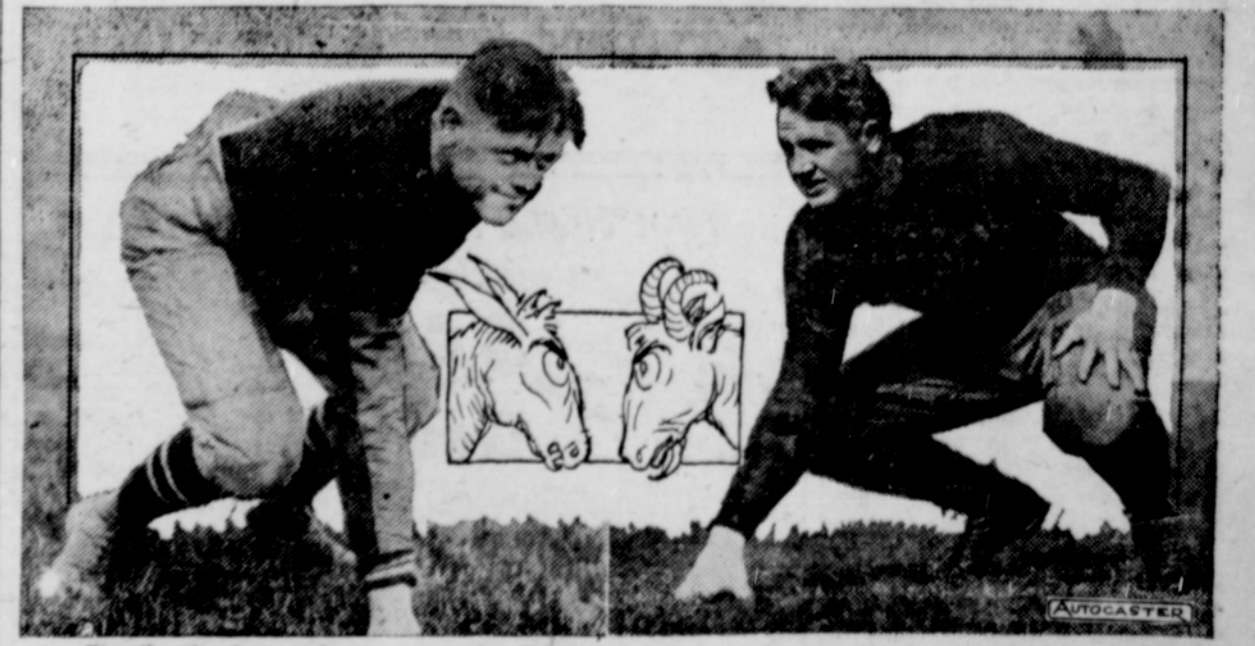
