Women Tried for Murder.

Both state and national interest is centered in the trial of two women charged with murder, one in Oregon and one in New Jersey. Mrs. Eva McGee, of Tillamook is charged with the poisoning of her husband, Dr. W. G. McGee, a physician, whose death occurred last August under suspicious circumstances. The evidence shows death resulted from an overdose of strychnine, but who administered it? The other case is that of Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, who with her two brothers, Henry and Willie Stevens, is charged with the murder of her husband's sweetheart, Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills, on September 14, 1922, in New Jersey. Her husband, the Rev. Edward W. Hall, was murdered at the same time and place. There is clear motive for the double killing?

Community Chest Lags.

"The very heart of Portland is to be tested these next two days," say those directing the community chest effort of raising \$639,724 for various charitable institutions and causes for the year 1927. The 1500 or more workers have been at it a week. They lack \$146,000 of the goal that has been set and hope to bring this up before next Sunday dawn. If the full quota is raised it will be the first time in six years of similar effort. Other cities provide for their charities by the same method and meet their needs in full. Why should not Portland? The community chest method is adopted to avoid the repeated solicitation of various organizations, tag days, etc.

GRAY HAIR FOR BALDNESS.

The new cathode ray tube invented by Dr. W. D. Coolidge may be of boundless benefit to the world but at present it is only an enticing plaything for scientists. Experiments, however, may prove it to be one of the really great discoveries of this marvelous age.

The new ray has been tried on poor helpless rabbits. One of the things learned is that when the ear of a rabbit was exposed to the ray for only one second the original gray hair fell out to be replaced two weeks later by a luxuriant growth of white hair three times as heavy as the original. This suggests it may become a cure for baldness if any prefers white hair to a red or white bare pate. Of course, the white hair could be dyed and it would be a covering anyway.

This new cathode ray tube may lead to a cure for cancer, something the medical world has been seeking diligently for years. Bacteria die speedily under its effects. Experiments with the new tube show it contains as many Beta rays as would be contained in a ton of radium. It is said only about a pound of radium is known to exist today.

The real value of the ray is not yet known. It remains for science having discovered this new powerful agency to continue experiments to develop its practical uses. It is more powerful, more penetrating and more destructive than the now well known X-ray.

But we are assured by the inventor that it cannot be put to very destructive uses because with the highest voltage possible the ray's range is no more than a few yards, preventing its use as a "death ray" in war.

The advertising campaign launched about Nov. 1, in publications including many farm magazines and daily newspapers in California, Texas, Florida and middle western states, by the land settlement department of the Portland and Oregon State Chambers of Commerce, is bringing a flood of inquiries promising to keep new settlers coming to Oregon all during the winter season, according to W. G. Ide, manager of the department.

SIN NEVER CURED SIN.

When the Bible says jealousy hath a most vehement flame it doesn't exaggerate. Horrible testimony given by a doctor as to the killing of Mrs. Mills, in the Hall-Mills murder case, proves it. The unfortunate woman, after bullets had been fired into her head, was dreadfully mutilated. Her throat was cut twice, her tongue cut out, and there were other horrible wounds inflicted on the dead body. The tongue is supposed to have been cut out because the woman's singing had charmed her clergyman from his straight and narrow path.

The horrible case will again remind men that whoever stirs up jealousy stirs up danger. They have been reminded of it, often enough, for five hundred thousand years, by blows on the head with sharp flints, by poison in the Middle Ages, by pistols later.

Bicycle Rider Killed by Auto.

The death of a 14-year old boy, Raymond Hoffner of Portland, as a result of being hit by an auto at night while he was riding along 82d street without a light on his bike will serve to remind boys of the danger of riding at night without a tail light. A city ordinance requires a bicycle to carry a light and the autoist who drove into the boy could not be held. Boys should not ride bikes along dark roads or streets without lights for their protection.
