"LET THERE BE LIGHT."

It is not blasphemous to say that man has adopted as his slogan this first utterance of the Creator as recorded in the scriptures.

Aside from the sunlight shed upon the world by that first demand of the Creator over his creation it may be said the world was for ages groping in darkness from sunset to sunrise.

This condition is no longer true of any modern city or community.

The kerosene lamp was a great step toward a better lighting of the homes and places of business. But the great change has come with the electric light. And in this the growth has been phenomenal.

The electric light has just passed its 47th birthday. Think of it! Forty-seven years ago there were no electric lights. Thomas Edison's first lamps were not much like the Edison Mazda of today.

For many years the electric light was enjoyed by a few; it was too expensive for the masses. Today it is the cheapest kind of light. Its cost is so insignificant in the family budget that it is hardly considered.

From nothing to over 7 1/2 billion dollars invested, is the record of less than half a century of electric development. Single plants are now being built in the east, middle west and on the Pacific coast which develop hundreds of thousands of horsepower. To shut off electric lights today would jeopardize health and destroy commercial activity in the nation.

Mr. Edison at 84, has taken part in the growth of an industry from the beginning as probably no other man has ever been privileged to do, remarks The Manufacturer.

But electricity is not for light alone. As a source of power its influence has been revolutionary. Said William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, in a recent speech:

"As the use of electricity and power enables the worker to become more efficient—to raise his standard of service—his wage must correspondingly rise."

Such a wage philosophy, he added, "is quite simple in that it provides that if industry increases its productivity through the efficiency of the workers, there will be more to divide between employer and employee."

The Cleveland Citizen, going further into the subject, says: "In Great Britain the power behind each worker is about one-half that in the United States, and the wage level is about one half. In Japan the power per man is about one-fourth and the wages one-fourth. In China, practically none, and the wages almost nothing."

TOO MUCH COMPULSION.

It irks to have too much compulsion foisted upon the supposedly free American citizen. It tends to destroy individual liberty and responsibility and leads to carelessness if not open revolt.

Compulsory automobile liability insurance is one of the latest to be agitated and the insurance company that would profit largely thereby is usually the agitator. Will our legislators fall for it? Let us hope not.

The well edited Canby Herald has the following to say on the subject:

There has been considerable talk on the subject of compulsory automobile liability insurance. Massachusetts has adopted such a law which takes effect in 1927. The question to consider is "How far should the government go in forcing the individual to insure the public against his own carelessness?" The law already provides that every man is liable for his own carelessness.

The theory of compulsory automobile liability insurance is that if a man has nothing with which to satisfy a judgment, insurance would furnish the necessary funds. The trouble is the man who is responsible also has to carry insurance. If this law is to be applied to carelessness with automobiles, why not with carelessness to fires.

Why should not the owner of property which has a great danger in fire hazard not be required to insure his neighbors against his own carelessness. It's a big problem to consider. Each new law of this kind shifts responsibility to an agent and tends to breed carelessness in the principal.

Also each law of this kind drives the cost of living a notch higher.
