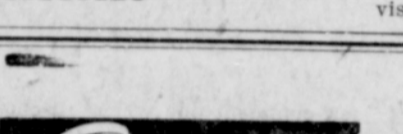

According to figures given by Henry E. Reed of Portland, based on census reports, it is shown that the east side of the city is growing in population way out of proportion to the west side. In 1920, of a total population of 258,288 given the city, the east side had 184,057 and the west side 74,231. This is 28.7 per cent for the west side and 71.3 per cent for the east side. In 1910 it was 41.8 and 58.2 respectively. The proportion for this year is estimated at 25 per cent west side to 75 per cent east side.
