

Burglars Plunder Powell Valley Store

The general merchandise store of Anderson & Alm in Powell Valley, three miles east of Gresham, was visited by burglars Tuesday evening and more than \$500 worth of dry goods, shoes, groceries and novelties were stolen. A glass in the front door was broken and entrance made through it. There is every evidence that the thief or thieves took their time in plundering thoroughly.

A better night could not have been selected, as it was sleeting, and a track in the snow would be covered in a few minutes. On account of the disagreeable evening no one was abroad and there is not the slightest clew to work on in apprehending the marauders. A little of everything seems to have been taken, after a thorough checking over by the proprietors. Gingham, percales and other yardage goods, shirts, overalls, shoes, socks, watches, and groceries seem to have struck the fancy and little was left in the store that had not been ransacked.

Police authorities were notified, but as there is nothing to work on, little hope is held out of any arrest. The loss is a complete one as the stock is not protected by burglary insurance.
