Next Monday, January 9, the state legislative assembly will meet at Salem. There are 30 senators and 60 representatives. Of the 30 senators three are democrats and all the rest are republicans. Of the 60 members of the house four are democrats and 56 are republicans. Oregon now has a republican governor, secretary of state and treasurer, who constitute the board of control. Representative John H. Carlin, of Jackson county, is speaker-to-be of the house. It is learned that postoffice inspectors have checked up on the individuals advertising under the above and other names and find they are using the mails to defraud. The Portland Better Business Bureau has also investigated and finds the advertising unreliable. It is probable many newspapers and magazines were duped. The Outlook was caught off its guard. It is hoped no one locally lost by replying to the ad. Any persons who have complaints against the Acme Orange Farms for non-delivery are asked to correspond with the postoffice inspector in Portland or the Portland Better Business Bureau.
