

Pastor Celebrates Fifth Anniversary

An interesting service was held Sunday morning at the Smith Memorial Presbyterian church at Fairview, the occasion of the fifth anniversary of the Rev. E. R. D. Hollensted's pastorate. The church auditorium was filled to capacity and the elders occupied the pulpit with the pastor, taking a part in the service.

After preaching a brief sermon on a motto for 1927, the pastor gave a statistical report of the five years' work which showed substantial progress. Forty-six members have been welcomed into the church membership, making a total of 75, the largest in the history of the church. Congregational and benevolent expenses have been promptly and generously met.

The Rev. Harry H. Pratt, who presided when the pastor was installed five years ago, was present and gave an address commending the people and pastor. He said he was especially glad they had secured a manse, in this way establishing a more permanent pastoral relation. The church was beautifully decorated and special music was rendered by a male quartet. Two solos were given by Wittmer McDonald.

At the close of the service and to the great surprise of the pastor, George Lumsden, one of the elders, stepped forward and in a few well chosen words presented the pastor with a gold watch, the joint gift of the Fairview and Troutdale congregations. Another marked feature was the presence of the Fairview city council in a body and the mayors of both Troutdale and Fairview.
