ESSAY CONTEST COMES TO CLOSE FEB. 1

The First State Bank asks the Outlook to remind teachers and students that the essay contest in both high schools and grade schools, for which several prizes are offered, closes February 1, at which time all essays must be in the hands of First State Bank or envelopes containing same must bear postmark as of February 1.

The First State Bank gives below its reply to the person who wrote the letter which was published in last week's Outlook which may explain more fully the intention of the First State Bank in giving the instructions it did regarding the essay contest.

Answering your letter of January 8th wherein you take exception to our mention of Robert Morris in connection with speculative and vicious habits in our instructions regarding First State Bank essay contest, the subject of which is "Our Government. How can each of us best live to preserve it." I think you have misconstrued the meaning of the word "Vicious" as used by us in our instructions.

The new Standard dictionary gives us the definition of Vicious as "marked by imperfection or faults, defective, especially in legal or logical validity, as a vicious title or vicious reasoning." One of Webster's definitions for vicious is: "Incorrect, as vicious reasoning."

Shakespeare says "Most vicious mole of nature in them, though I perchance am vicious in my guess." Harper's Encyclopedia, in speaking of Robert Morris, says "Entering into such a speculation in his old age, he lost his fortune." Appleton's Encyclopedia, regarding Robert Morris, says "In partnership with Gouverneur Morris, he went largely into East India and China trade. His speculations ultimately failed and he spent several years in the debtor's cell."

Of course it is to be regretted that a man that did so much for his country as Robert Morris should ever be confined in a cell as he was. That he was speculative and incorrect in at least some of his reasoning is quite certain. Had he been otherwise and conservative in his reasoning, he probably could not have furnished the financial assistance to our government that he did. Fortunately he was able to repay his obligations for the time being, and had he been more conservative after he severed his connection with our Government, he doubtless would have died quite wealthy. His wife showed more forethought and correct reasoning than he and by it provided for him a home after he had been released from prison.

It is this matter of correct reasoning that the First State Bank is trying to bring upon the young people by means of its essay contest. When properly taken up by the teacher, it cannot fail to be of some help in forming character and impressing the younger people with the necessity of correct reasoning, sober and conservative thought as to the future, rather than otherwise.

FLAT RATES ORDERED ON AIR MAIL POST

The change in rates on air mail, effective February 1, 1927, fix a flat rate of 10 cents per half ounce or fraction thereof, regardless of destination, for any place in the United States, which will doubtless serve to popularize the air mail service, as a letter may now be sent to the east coast for 10 cents, whereas under the former zoning rate, the postage was 25 cents.

New air mail stamps are being prepared and will soon be available to the public at the local post office. Until these air mail stamps are received, the regular issue of 10 and 20 cent stamps may be used, care being exercised to mark the letters with the notation, via Air Mail.

A considerable saving in time is effected by the use of the air mail service, as the schedule time on letters from Pasco, Washington, the western terminal, and New York City, is 46 hours, which would mean a saving of three or four days over the regular time by train.

The new 20 cent air mail stamp which, according to Postmaster Elizabeth E. Johnson, will be available here early in February, will be of the same size as the present air mail stamps, and will be printed in green. A map of the United States will be carried on them with two airplanes, one flying east and the other west.

COUNTY COW TESTER SEEKS "BOARDERS"

Unprofitable or "boarder" cows are being eliminated by the members of the Clackamas cow testing association through the aid of a pair of scales and the Babcock tester. Once each month the tester employed by the association, visits each farm and weighs and tests one day's milk from each cow. He also weighs and computes the value of each cow's feed. In this way the farmer has accurate data at hand concerning his cows.

Testing is gaining in popularity among the small farmers due to the fact that several may join together and reduce the cost per cow. For the month of December 42 herds and 432 cows were tested as compared with 34 herds and 383 cows for November.

The average butter-fat production for the association for December was 22.9 pounds. Ninety-nine cows made over 40 pounds of butter-fat and seven made over 70 pounds.

The high cow for December is owned by Buxton Brothers, of Molalla. She produced 1383 pounds of milk containing 87.1 pounds of butterfat. She is a registered Jersey cow six years old. The high grade cow is owned by F. H. Greenman and Son, of Fairview. This cow, which is 12 years old, produced 1736 pounds of milk yielding 85.1 pounds of butterfat.

In the purebred class W. F. Fisher's Jersey herd of five cows at Sandy stood second in the average production of butterfat and average milk production, with 44.4 pounds in the former and 835 in the latter. F. H. Greenman's Guernsey herd of 13 cows produced an average of 936 pounds of milk and 42.3 pounds of butterfat. These cows are in the three high herds in purebred and grade herds respectively.

The annual meeting of the Oregon State Holstein Breeders association will be held at the Knights of Pythias hall at Forest Grove, Oregon, on Saturday, January 29. The morning session will begin at 10 o'clock. Routine business will be conducted and the annual election of officers held. Talks will be given by W. B. Barney of the Extension Service and R. E. Everly, fieldman, F. W. Durbin of Salem is president of the association and Paul C. Adams of Warren is secretary.
