At the State Legislature

Speaker Addresses Salem Chamber Speaker John H. Carkin addressed the membership of the Salem Chamber of Commerce recently.

In his discussion of what is being done at the present session Mr. Carkin declared that not only are the house and senate passing laws and making appropriations for the taxpayers to pay, but at the same time the people themselves are making laws and authorizing appropriations for continued expenditures.

He made it clear that as a matter of fact most of the increases in state taxes have been authorized by the vote of the people. That the legislators themselves authorized very little except for the upkeep of penal institutions and other established state activities and expenses regularly authorized for state officials.

Mr. Carkin also showed that appropriations made by the legislature are only a small part of the total taxpayers' bill—in fact, less than 10 per cent of it—and that if the legislature should meet and determine to make no appropriations whatever for any purpose the taxpayer would still be confronted with nine-tenths of his present tax burden.

Session Handicapped for Time. Directly referring to the work of the assembly, the speaker showed that the effort made by him and the cordial response of members of the lower house to his request for early presentation of bills had resulted in securing introduction of a larger number of measures in the first two weeks of the session than ever before.

Mr. Carkin praised the work of the house members but expressed the view that the 40 days was altogether too short a time in which to carefully consider legislative matters. He suggested that Oregon should adopt the Californian plan of a divided session.

Shortcuts and Savings. Stressing the point that there was too much expended for hiring clerks and stenographers, Mr. Carkin referred to the plan he had in mind before the legislature met, whereby instead of having a special stenographer for each member the system in use by several states should be adopted.
