At present there is war in China, Portugal and Nicaragua, due no doubt to the influence of sunspots on the race. Perhaps the rest of us are at peace due to the exercise of self-restraint rather than the lack of opportunity.

Seymour Jones, by appointment of Governor Patterson, has succeeded C. E. Spence as state market agent. Mr. Spence resigned on account of poor health, and perhaps for political reasons. Mr. Jones is a man of wide experience and should do credit to the office.

MUST PAY THE FIDDLER. Oregon may yet have an income tax despite the fact that it has been twice defeated when submitted to vote of the people.

Patterson wasn't elected on a tax issue but he has faced the prospect of a \$4,000,000 deficit for the biennium and has proposed probably the only fair means left to him, namely an income tax and a titling bill.

Patterson's income tax measure was introduced in the house and passed that body 49 to 9. It has now passed the senate 27 to 3. It will be submitted to the people as soon as the legal requirements can be met which it is said will be not before the latter part of June.

The titling bill is yet to be fought out against strong opposition. It is apparent we are all in the same boat—cities, school districts, counties, state—that of wanting more than we can afford—living beyond our income. The six per cent increase in taxes allowed each year over the preceding year is not sufficient. We, the people, demand ever more and better and the costs of governmental administration, educational and industrial progress, mount higher and higher.

We have danced to the music, now we must pay the fiddler.

SOMETIME. While we live in a wonderful day of progress in many lines we are woefully deficient in others. Perhaps the failure is made more conspicuous by contrast.

Time was when states were widely separated and each was more of a government unto itself. The lack of uniformity in certain laws was unimportant. Now our various states hold a more intimate relation to each other because of a multiplicity of new conditions growing out of means of travel and communication and development of community interests.

There is need of uniform laws, covering marriage and divorce, automobiles, education, etc. These should be brought about by state enactments rather than federal and state governments should cooperate with one another to bring about uniformity of laws. Some day, let us hope, this will be the case.

Mrs. Susan Harding, worthy matron of Troutdale chapter of the Eastern Star, attended the patrons' and matrons' meeting in Portland Saturday.

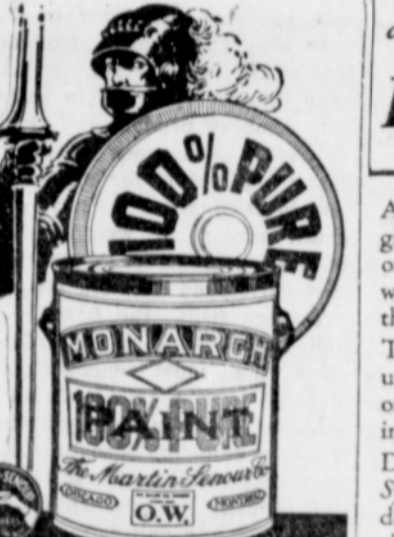
Through the courtesy of the Parent-Teacher association of Corbett, the reception room in the Columbian high can now boast of new furnishings.
