### Diphtheria Brings Health Nurse Here

The child had diphtheria, then make a desperate effort to save its life, sometimes unsuccessfully, sometimes at the expense of the child's later health. The newer and better way is to immunize the children against the disease while they are well, thereby saving untold suffering. Since the newer way has been used in Oregon there has been a material decrease in the number of cases in the state, with a reduction of more than 40 per cent in the number of deaths. "No Diphtheria in Oregon by 1930" is the slogan adopted by the state board of health at its meeting in Salem last month.

Gresham schools have been slow to avail themselves of the advantages freely offered by the health authorities, according to the county health nurse, who believes that parents should be informed of the situation and of dangers to their children which could easily be avoided.

An effort will be made to give the children of the high school the Schick test in the near future, to determine who among them are susceptible to diphtheria. Since

many of them will already be immune, this is the procedure usually followed with the older children, rather than to give all of them the toxin-antitoxin. This test will be given to all the grade school children next fall to see if they have established their immunity.
