CHERRYVILLE MAN SUCCEUMBS TO ILLNESS

Funeral services were held this afternoon at the Methodist church at Sandy for the late Edward T. Wall, 27, of Cherryville, Oregon, who died Sunday after a brief illness as the result of nephritis following an attack of scarlet fever. Mr. Wall was brought to the home of Mrs. Harriet Timmerman a week ago for medical observation and treatment, but as the symptoms gradually began to grow more alarming, it was thought best to remove him to a hospital. He was taken to the Portland sanitarium where he lived but a few hours.

The deceased is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Wall of Cherryville, three sisters Mrs. Alice Hivley of Portland, Mrs. Alma Larson of Brightwood and Minnie Wall of Cherryville, and four brothers Frank, George, Oscar and Carl all of Cherryville. Interment was made in the Sandy cemetery.
