

### CUPS AND MEDALS ARE ON DISPLAY

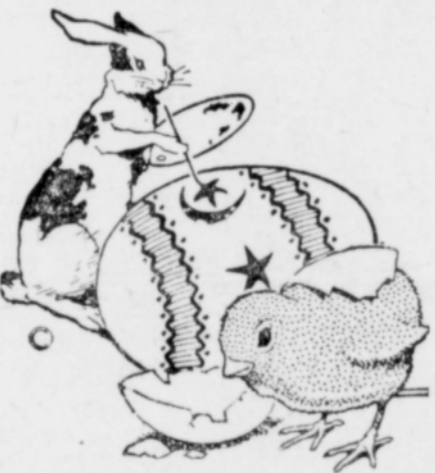

### LA GRANDE MAN WINS PRIZE TRACT

In the recent homestead tract drawing which was conducted in the United States land office at Portland, Louis D. Harris of La-Grande was the successful winner of the coveted 80-acre tract on the Mt. Hood Loop highway. Of the 189 war veterans who filed applications for government tracts, 109 wanted the Brightwood piece of land which has 20 acres available for farming. The drawing, which was conducted under federal authority, is for the settlement of the O. & C. land grant and involves about 9000 acres of land in the Portland district. The balance of the property coming under this grant consists of 23,000 acres and is being handled by the Roseburg land office. War veterans are being given the preference over all other applicants for a limited time.

The attendance on the first and second days was 113 and 123 respectively. On last Tuesday it was 166 and yesterday 174. These numbers did not include the dozen or so of children who came with their mothers each day.

It is likely that the attendance the last day would have been larger except for an unfortunate error in announcing the day. The Outlook received from a representative of the Portland Gas & Coke company a letter giving Mrs. Bartlett's plan for the closing class, which said that it would be on Friday. In writing the story for the paper, the error was not noticed, and the closing class was announced for Friday instead of Thursday.
