

FRUIT BUYER PLANS SUMMER CAMPAIGN

Plans are being made by Denny & Co., well-known fruit dealers, to buy in this district next summer, according to R. R. Hurst, district manager, who was in Gresham Wednesday looking over the situation. Mr. Hurst asserted that he had received word from the Chicago office of his company that Denny & Co. are again in line financial condition. The same information is contained in reliable trade papers throughout the country. It was reported by some trade papers that the big concern had felt some anxiety in making arrangements for finances this season for their various extensive operations. This condition was largely through heavy advances to growers, especially in the large apple shipping districts, and the poor apple market last season. The company was never in better shape than now for meeting obligations to growers, according to reports, as all paper has been guaranteed by Continental & Commercial Bank of Chicago. This company will operate heavily in this section this season, both in shipments of fruits and vegetables. It handled something over ten thousand cars the past season, about four hundred through the Portland office.
