While this is an "unofficial" count we know it has been made so carefully that it can be counted on as the actual population of the city on April 1st.

The question is often asked, What is your population? We have been saying it was close to 2000.

This actual count disappoints us because it turns out to be so much less than we thought.

Even 1568 gives us a city of no mean size and the character of its homes and people and extent of its business makes it a city to be proud of.

TELEGRAM IN RECEIVERSHIP.

Yesterday Judge Evans appointed Amadeo M. Smith permanent receiver for the Portland Telegram.

CUSTOM-BUILT CARS DEMANDED BY MANY

"The country is highly prosperous. It wants something better in cars—something different and something with finer finish. We are finding the demand for custom-built broughams and sedans perhaps the outstanding feature of our business this spring."

"At the national automobile show, the Hudson Motor Car Co. created much interest through offering a fairly complete line of both open and enclosed cars," said Mr. Webster.

"The Hudson idea was that it could go to a custom-builder, ask of him the finest materials and workmanship available anywhere, and yet by contracting for all the cars he could make to lower his manufacturing costs and do away with his selling costs altogether."

"The bodies themselves are made in New England. The firm making them—like practically all fine custom-builders in the country—originally built hansom, broughams and other luxurious horse-drawn vehicles."

"In this plant, as with other custom-builders, the methods are those of the hand-worker. The body shapes, for instance, instead of being stamped out on giant metal presses, are hand-hammered. The metal is not steel, but aluminum sheets. There is not, in fact, one die or press in the whole factory."

"The Hudson organization reports that its experiment has been an instant success. Indeed, it is claimed that the four largest cities of the United States have made requests for all the custom-built cars which can be built for the coming six months."

"The supplying of finer motor cars, it is found, is one of the fields of motor car development, which hitherto has been overlooked."

"Men and women today are looking for more than transportation in their cars—more in fact than the traditional combination of looks, price—and performance. Many of them want a car which differs from the thousands of its kind which literally stream from a big motor factory."

"The experience of the Hudson organization leads them to say that this is an entirely new field. The demand for standard cars remains—as it always will—the principal activity of the business, but in supplying luxurious and distinctive cars mounted on chassis of proven worth, an opportunity has been found to serve a great army of motorists who know what they want and are willing to pay for it."

BUICK INCREASES DAILY OUTPUT

With production of 1927 models well past the 200,000 mark on April 1, the Buick Motor company is over 20,000 cars ahead of its best previous output record for this time of the year, according to information furnished by Walter W. Metzger, local dealer.

Among the features of the program is the new, efficient unified assembly system which takes care of any normal output of Buick cars, which was planned and built by Durham and his corps of plant engineers. This assembly system is capable of receiving and assembling 225 tons of materials an hour, most of which are delivered to the line by a system of conveyors.

Workmen are now building the new \$5,000,000 gray iron foundry which will have a daily capacity of 600 tons of castings. It is expected that this unit will be in operation some time during the summer.

The present capacity of the plant is 1,200 cars a day. Car building has proceeded at or near this figure ever since the 1927 models were introduced, Durham says. At present production is 1,100 cars a day, the highest rate ever reached at this time of the year. The schedule was increased a hundred cars a day in March when it was found necessary to revise the original plans for the month, due to the demand for cars.
