

### Troutdale Men Have Enjoyable Party

Thirty-eight men of Troutdale and the surrounding country spent an enjoyable social evening at the Masonic hall dining room last Tuesday evening at the invitation of the Rev. E. R. D. Hollensted, pastor of the community church. The Ladies Aid society served an enjoyable dinner. A collection taken at the table more than paid the expense of the banquet. After the men had sung a number of old standard and popular songs, Rev. Mr. Hollensted, introduced Chaplain John W. Beard of Portland, who gave a splendid address on the ideals of the earlier pioneers, and the task of men of the present day in the interest of and for the benefit of the great multitude settling in increasing numbers on this Pacific coast, with special reference to the mission of the little church in the community.

G. P. Lumsden, a former resident of Troutdale, also spoke of the faithfulness and struggle of the little band who had in years past stood by the church with special reference to the faithful labors of the Ladies Aid society.

Rev. Mr. Hollensted appealed to the men present to consider this church as a community affair of interest and importance to all. He stated that repairs should be made to the building or a movement started toward building a new chapel. He asked that a building committee be nominated to consider the proposition, and the following committee was nominated: John Burns, A. D. Kendall, T. F. Parsons, Chas. Scott, E. D. Hewitt, W. C. Spence and O. W. Martin. A meeting of this committee will be held in the near future to decide this matter.

Waldemar Hollensted, son of the pastor and a member of the KGW staff of Portland, sang two baritone solos and presided at the piano during the singing.

Rev. Hollensted was much pleased over the success and value of this kind of gathering of men only, and stated that he plans a similar gathering later on during the year, when it is expected that even a larger number of men will respond.
