GRADE SCHOOL NOTES.

At a meeting of the county grade school principals held in Portland on April 9 a baseball schedule was arranged. The schools of the county were divided into two classes and a series of games will be played in each class. The winner of the series between each of the schools, Gresham, Russellville, Gilbert, Parkrose, Powellhurst and Orient and Powell Valley combined, will receive a pennant. In case of a tie the tying schools will play on the Montavilla park grounds May 18.

Gresham has played two games of the series, winning in both, Parkrose 12 to 4 and Orient and Powell Valley 4 to 3. Two games remain to be played, one with Gilbert May 6 and with Russellville May 17, both on the home grounds. The boys playing on the baseball team were undefeated in basketball and football during the respective seasons.

The eighth grade exemption tests throughout the county will be held in three places this year, Corbett high school April 27; Gresham grade school April 28 and Russellville April 29. All schools east of Gresham and west of the Sandy river will be included in the Gresham district. The eighth grade state examinations will be held May 12 and 13 in each school of the county.

May 6 has been planned by the Gresham Union high school authorities as eighth grade visiting day. The students of the grade school are looking forward with much interest to this occasion.

At a meeting of the grade school board last evening the present teachers were re-elected for the coming year.
