

Troutdale Bluff Given New Name

An item of interest to all people of Troutdale and vicinity appeared in Sunday's Journal April 24 in regard to the rocky bluff on the east side of the Sandy river at Troutdale. The U. S. Geographic board at Washington, D. C., on October 6, 1926, adopted the name "Broughton Bluff" as a magnificent memorial to Lieutenant Broughton who raised the flag of Great Britain near the foot of this bluff October 30, 1792, and officially took possession of the great water shed of the Columbia river.

The item says "Broughton bluff is a beautiful and picturesque mass of rock some 400 feet in height and marks the western limit of the Cascade range, since the level country commences at its foot."

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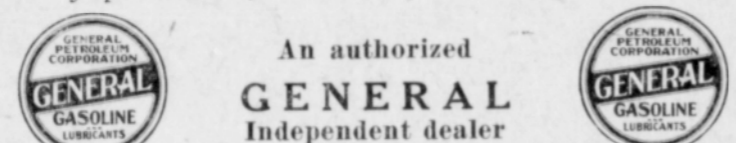
