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MOTHER'S DAY.

Next Sunday, May 8, being the second Sunday in May, will be generally observed as Mother's Day and many and loving will be the tributes paid to her character and memory.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION. Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the City of Fairview, Oregon, on the 16th day of May, 1927, at which time there will be submitted to the legal voters of said City for their adoption or rejection the Charter amendment hereinafter set forth, to-wit:

RESOLUTION. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW, MULTNOMAH COUNTY, OREGON, that the following proposed amendments to the charter of said City be and the same hereby are proposed for submission to the legal voters of said City for their adoption or rejection at a special election to be held on the 16th day of May, 1927, as herein provided, to-wit:

CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL. To amend the charter of the City of Fairview, as amended by the legal voters at an election on March 1, 1911, and to amend all other amendments heretofore enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW that the charter of the City of Fairview, as amended by the legal voters at an election on March 1, 1911, and as amended by all acts or amendments heretofore enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people, as the same is hereby amended by adding thereto Chapter 1, to read as follows:

ARTICLE I. For the purpose of procuring funds with which to acquire, construct and provide a municipal water system for the City of Fairview, Oregon, the Common Council of said City is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell negotiable coupon bonds of the city in a sum not to exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), said bonds to be in denominations of five hundred dollars (\$500) or one thousand dollars (\$1,000). Each bond shall be payable at maturity and promise to pay the bearer of each of said bonds at maturity the principal and interest thereon, whereof the City of Fairview shall be bound to pay the principal and interest thereon at the rate of not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually, each of said bonds to bear interest on the obligation of the City of Fairview, Oregon, said bonds to be dated at a certain day, to be fixed by the Council, maturity or maturities to be likewise fixed by the Council, but not to exceed twenty years from their date, and the principal and interest of said bonds shall be made payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City, and the City of Fairview Water Bonds.

The debt limitations contained in the charter of said City shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized.

The Common Council shall each year at the time of making the annual tax levy for city purposes, include in such levy a sum sufficient to pay interest on the outstanding bonds of this issue, and to retire the principal thereof at maturity.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this resolution for proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters at the Common Council be filed with the Recorder of the City of Fairview for submission to the legal voters of said City for their adoption or rejection, to be voted upon at a special election to be held on the 16th day of May, 1927.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Common Council of the City of Fairview deems it advisable and does hereby authorize and empower the Mayor to be held on the 16th day of May, 1927. The polls for the receipt of ballots shall be opened at the hour of eight o'clock a. m. and shall close at the hour of eight o'clock p. m. on the day of the said election.

The following named place be and it is hereby designated as the polling place for said election, and the following named be and they are designated and appointed as to be Judges and Clerks of election, to act at said polling place for said election, to-wit:

Polling place: City Hall, Fairview, Oregon.

E. E. Heslin, Chairman, and John Peterson, and E. R. D. Hollensted, Judges, and Daisy G. Shaw, and Ruth Moller, Clerks.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that for the hereinabove proposed amendments the following ballot title be and the same hereby is adopted by the Council, to-wit:

To amend the charter of the City of Fairview as amended by the voters at an election held March 1, 1911, and to amend all other amendments thereto, by adding Chapter 1, authorizing the issuance and sale of \$20,000 bonds of said City to provide funds with which to acquire, construct and provide a municipal water system for said City, and providing for a special tax levy to pay interest and principal of said bonds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Recorder be and he is instructed and required to publish the hereinabove charter amendments submitted to the voters by the Council in the manner required by law—that is to say, by publication of this resolution, with the ballot title and number in full in the Gresham Outlook, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Fairview, at least once not more than fifteen nor less than seven days immediately preceding said special election and publishing the same in three conspicuous places in the City of Fairview at least seven (7) days prior to said special election, at which said proposed amendments are to be voted upon.
