**BEE KEEPERS MUST PROCURE LICENSE**

All persons keeping one or more colonies of bees must have a license, according to the provisions of a state law. The cost of the license is one dollar a year, and failure to have the license carries with it a penalty of from \$10 to \$100. Licenses may be obtained at the county courthouse. This is the final notice to the public, according to F. Beier, county bee inspector. Those wishing to have their bees inspected should notify Mr. Beier, 1302, Union avenue, North, Portland.
