Lindbergh—the hero of the day! the intrepid youth!

Lindbergh—the most outstanding example of the modern spirit of achievement.

Lindbergh—the unassuming temperate, considerate, fearless—the conqueror!

Lindbergh is an American and we are proud of him and his starting achievement. He is of Swedish and Irish descent, evidently a good combination, producing thoughtful, almost stoical patience and determination with simplicity, good humor, daring and dash. He is a credit to his father (deceased), one of Minnesota's most worthy and influential citizens. He is a credit to his mother, a chemistry teacher in a Detroit high school, a fine type of woman.

He has won a distinguished honor for his country and his name will go down in history.

But young Lindbergh belongs not only to America. He belongs to civilization, to humanity. By his accomplishment the race moves up a long step in the achievement of its purpose, ideals and destiny—to conquer and use the forces God has ordained for our development and use.

What Lindbergh has done others can and will do. What he has done will become common after a while—but he is the hero who first showed it could be done.

A DEDICATION. The news of the killing Sunday afternoon of Lester M. Wood, sheriff of Clark county, Washington, in cold blood by a murderous boot-legger, shooting from ambush, brings deep sorrow to the hearts of all good citizens whether acquainted with the man and his family or not.

The officer, with a deputy, was searching for a nest of bootleggers in the hills northeast of Vancouver and evidently was about to apprehend them when a shot rang out from the bushes and the sheriff fell, mortally wounded.

The victim was a son of Col. W. S. Wood, of Vancouver, the well known auctioneer. Both, father and son are well known in Gresham and vicinity.

That such a dastardly deed could occur right in the heart of a modern civilized community and with no other motive than the protection of an unlawful and nefarious business seems incredible. But such is the desperate and murderous character of those who ally themselves with the devil in the promotion of a practice that is, always has been and always will be, under the curse of the Almighty.

Such an act brings to us a truer sense of the difficult and dangerous situation we as a nation face in all our efforts to enforce law, morality and righteousness against one of the most damning and destructive forces that ever menaced the race. Strong drink is the mother of a cohort of crimes.

How, in the face of such crimes as this, and their number is legion, men who put on a pretense of decency and good citizenship can by word and act lend even the semblance of encouragement to the liquor business and try to break down the principle and effort of law enforcement is more than we can understand.

But we are sure of this, that this murderous act, and many others like it, lead us to rededicate ourselves, heart and brain and hand, to the utmost reasonable effort to support the purpose, legal and moral, to rid this country and the earth of this blight on humanity.

The boot-legger is potentially a murdered at heart. He manufactures a poison that kills directly or indirectly and he knows its effect. He has no good purpose. He knows he makes and sells what destroys both body and soul and his only object is to get the money he can thus obtain. Hence he is most despicable and traitorous.

We urge that every American citizen convicted of bootlegging be disfranchised, and every alien be deported. This along with other means of enforcement would help some.

Taft, Oregon, May 15, 1927.—Editor Outlook:—The weather at present is certainly lovely, clear and bright, with light refreshing breeze from the north.
