

Guernsey Picnic to Be at Boring, June First

An event of great interest to admirers of fancy and pure bred stock will be the Clackamas county Guernsey picnic, which will be held at the Cascade farm owned and operated by J. A. and T. J. Richey, on Wednesday, June 1. A program is being prepared, and some men who have made a study of the dairy business and who are the breeders of purebred stock will be present and give talks along these lines. An old fashioned basket dinner will be served at noon.

The herd of pure bred Guernsey cattle on Cascade farm will be inspected. This herd, which consists of about 30 head, is one of the best in the county and ranks among the very best in the state. The Richeys have one imported cow, but the most outstanding animal and the one that the most interest is centered on at present by members of the Guernsey association of the county is the herd bull. This animal was purchased by the Richeys two years ago from a Guernsey breeder in Pennsylvania. It took many prizes at the Oregon State fair last fall. All who are interested in fine stock, although not breeders of Guernseys, are invited to the picnic.

On Saturday, June 4th, the association will hold a Guernsey sale at Canby.

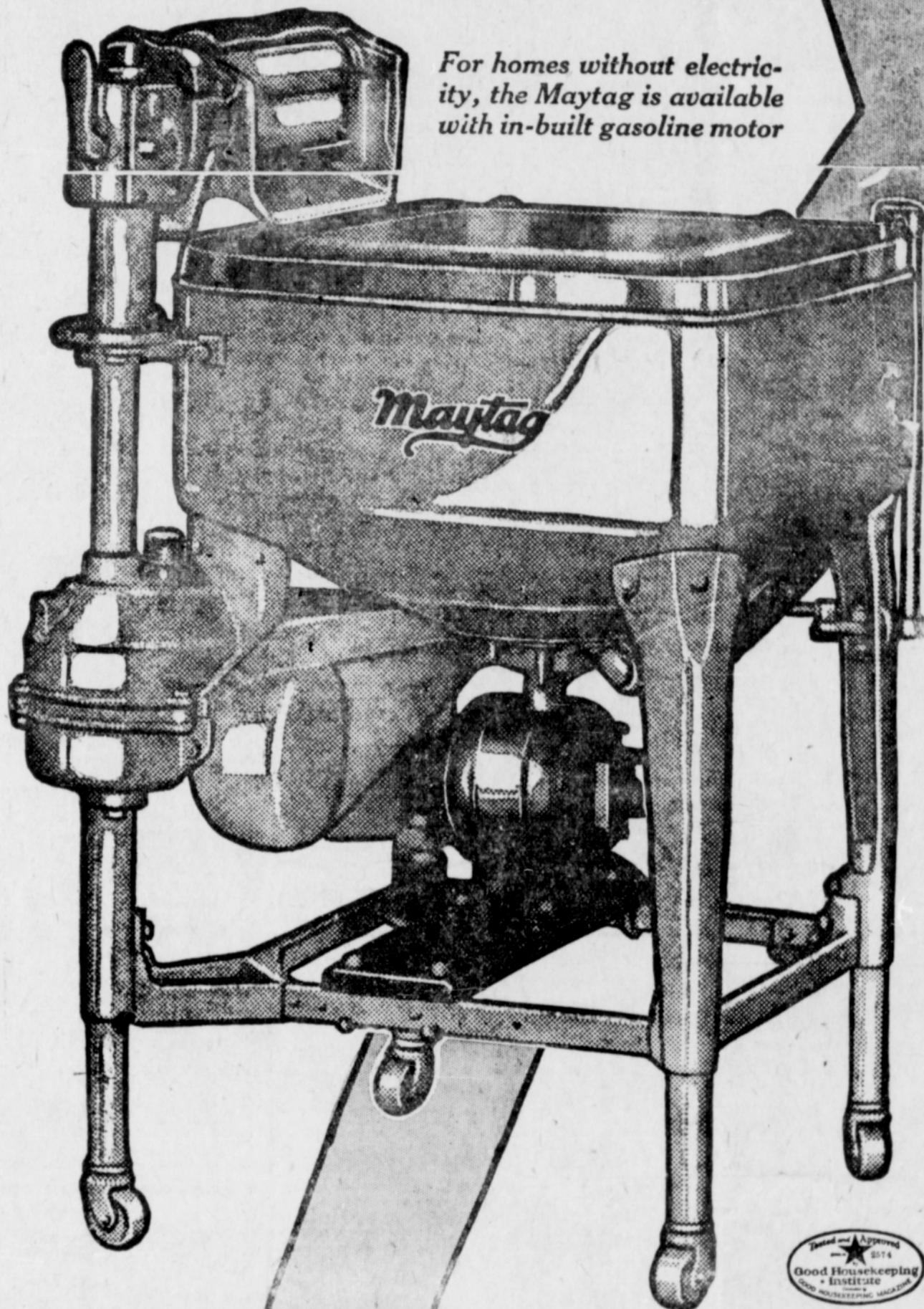
Miss Amy Gustafson was operated on Friday morning in St. Vincent's hospital for appendicitis. She is reported as getting along well.
