GRESHAM SCHOOL HAD LARGE ENROLLMENT

Some interesting figures are presented from the grade school in connection with last year's enrollment and attendance. The registration reached 412 during the year, of which the first grade had the highest 73. The fourth grade came next with an enrollment of 70, the fifth with 61 pupils, the second and sixth, 50 each, the third grade 49, the seventh 46 and the eighth 38. Of this number 226 were boys and 216 girls.

The total attendance for the 170 days was 57,432. It is easily seen that if one pupil attempted to put in the school days for the entire school, it would take him 338 years to complete the work.

Epidemics of diseases in mild form have seriously handicapped the school program the past two years, but the children have done well notwithstanding. This year 29 were graduated from the eighth grade, 24 at the close of the spring term and five at mid-term. Practically all the class will continue work in Gresham Union high.
