The survivors are the widower, four daughters Aletha, Goldie and Eva of Corbett and Mrs. Frances Washman of Bridal Veil; three sons, Walter, Robert and the infant son; a sister, Mrs. William Bramhall, of Battleground, Washington; three brothers Richard Butler, of Aiga,

Canada; David and Arthur Butler of Corbett. The family had resided for practically the past 25 years at the farm home near Corbett.

Funeral services will be conducted Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Columbia grange hall, with interment in Pounder cemetery. Arrangements are in the hands of the Gresham Funeral parlors.
