

Japanese Gardener Wins Legal Decision

A decision was handed down a few days ago from the state engineer's office at Salem in favor of M. Tamura, Japanese gardener living two miles east of Gresham, granting him the use of 15,000 gallons of water daily from Beaver creek for irrigation purposes. The decision grew out of a contention for water rights in the Beaver Bend district when residents of the vicinity objected on the grounds that he was depriving them of the use of the water and that by lowering the creek's supply the water would become a breeding place of mosquitoes.

Subsequent to a hearing at the Gresham city hall in March of this year the state engineer's office took the matter under advisement until a few days ago when a decision was made favorable to the gardener. At the Gresham hearing the engineer's office was represented by Mr. Coshov, a nephew of Judge Coshov of the supreme bench. W. J. Cooper, local attorney, represented Mr. Tamura's interests in the case.

The Damascus Grange is making arrangements for the Pomona Grange which will meet at the I. O. O. F. hall in Boring on June 29.

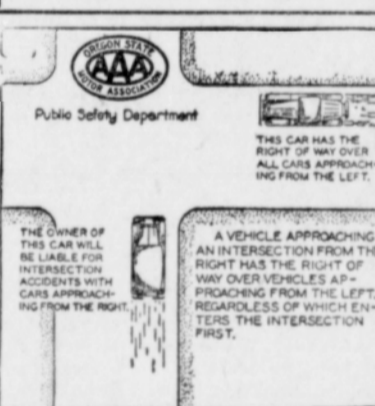
CORBETT

Automobile Hints



The Man on the Right is Right. "The man on the right is right."

In September 1925 the supreme court of Oregon rendered a decision based on the law as it then stood, that where two vehicles were simultaneously approaching a given point, at an intersection, the man on the left must look out for and give the right of way to the man on the right. The court in discussing the case covered considerable territory and some of the lower courts became confused and rendered decisions not consistent with such a broad declaration of the law.

Some of these lower courts even went so far as to hold that if the man on the left entered the intersection first, the man on the right had to stop and let him pass—This was tending to change the law back to the old "Button, button, who reached the button first", interpretation.

In order to clarify this situation and eliminate any question, the 1927 legislature amended paragraph 7 of the Rules of the Road to read, "Drivers when approaching highway intersections, shall look out for and give right of way to vehicles on the right, simultaneously approaching a given point whether such vehicle first enter and reach the intersection or not, provided, that street and interurban cars and emergency vehicles shall have the right of way at all times at such highway intersections."

In other words, at an intersection of highways, the man on the left must watch out for the man on the right, it does not matter which is the closer to the intersection or how fast the other fellow may be going. The man on the left, tries to pass in front of the man on the right, he does so at his own peril. This rule does not apply to street cars or emergency vehicles such as police and fire department vehicles and ambulances.

Mrs. Effie Beegle Dies in Seattle

Word was received in Gresham Wednesday of the unexpected death of a former resident of this place, Mrs. Effie Beegle, aged 71, mother of W. E. Beegle and Mrs. G. A. Cox, who passed away in a Seattle hospital that day as the result of an operation. She was visiting with a son, the Rev. Burton L. Beegle at Seattle when taken ill. Although she had the care of first-class physicians, including that of a nephew who is a specialist, a weak condition of the heart could not withstand the shock of the operation.

Funeral services will be conducted next Sunday, June 12, at 2:30, in the First Free Methodist church, East Ninth and Mill street, Portland, with interment following in Gresham cemetery by the side of her brother the Rev. Gibson of Tenino, Washington, and Miss Ada G. Beegle of Portland. Two brothers George W. and Fred reside in Illinois. A son died in infancy.

to the combustion chamber. The center of the intake manifold is within a section of the exhaust manifold, giving an extra large "hot spot" section. The fuel charge, passing from the carburetor to the cylinder heads, hits this "hot spot" and is raised to the proper temperature for effective vaporization before it enters the combustion chamber. The short distance which the fuel has to travel reduces the tendency for it to lag or condense as it passes to the cylinders.

Single Plate Clutch Used.
A single plate type of clutch is used. Its design is similar to that used on many of the highest priced cars such as Hispano Suiza, Pierce Arrow, Marmon, McFarlan, Locomobile, Peugeot, Sunbeam, Daimler, Duesenberg and the British Rolls-Royce. The pedal action is said to be lighter and softer than any other type, and gives a smooth, gentle application of power with no chattering of parts when it is released.

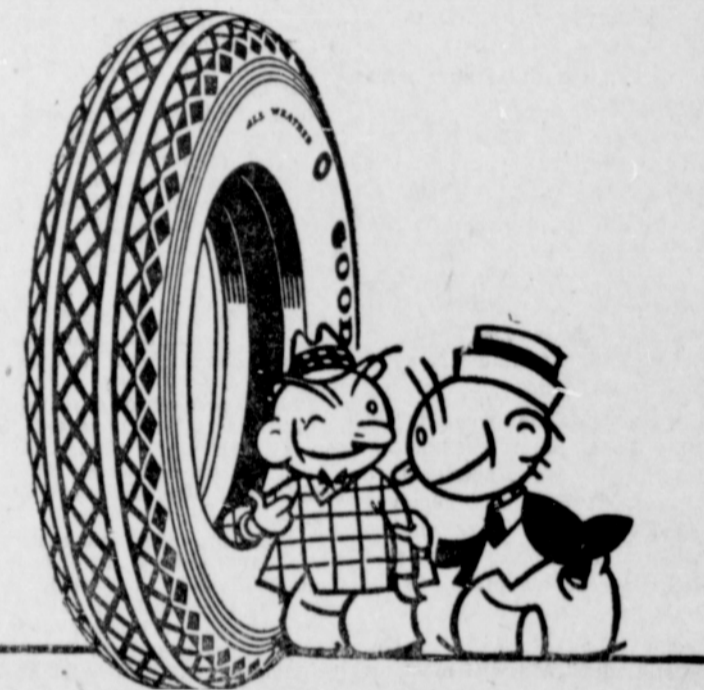
