### Strawberry Growers Instructions Given

The storm of last Tuesday worked havoc to strawberries which were ripe or ripening in the fields, the heavy rain driving the berries into the ground or covering them with mud. As a result the berries into the ground or covering since the storm were many of them unfit to use because of the dirt which was ground into them which could not be washed out. In a letter to the berry growers Manager D. E. Towle says that muddy berries cannot be used, but that they should be picked from the vines or they will cause other berries to mould. All berries for barreling should be fully colored.

The strawberry market prospects are not very bright, says Mr. Towle, and special care must be taken to keep up the high standard of quality to meet competition. Market conditions will not warrant paying over 1c for picking with one-half cent bonus. The association will not advance more than that for the picking.

The weevil bait is ready for delivery to the growers and should

be taken at once. It is pointed out that by using the bait as many berries can be grown on half the acres as would grow on the whole field without it, thus leaving half the acres for some other crop. Growers are urged to bring in

empty crates which they are not using, as they will be needed shortly.

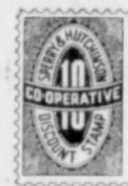
