Canby Retains Union District. In a recent election which attracted almost statewide attention the taxpayers of Union high school district No. 1, Canby, voted 462 to 132 against dissolving the district.

Chautauqua to Open at Gladstone Tuesday

The Willamette Valley chautauqua is an event which is looked forward to every year with much interest by the public at large, as the program is a varied one and well suited to every member of the family. The sessions are held in beautiful Gladstone park, near Oregon City, which is easily available by automobile, train and trolley. The program will begin this year on Tuesday, July 12.

The forenoon of each day excepting Sunday will be occupied with setting up exercises, a history class, the vacation Bible school, a training school conducted under the auspices of the Oregon Council of Religious Education.

On the opening day an address will be given by Dr. Joseph Schafer from the subject, "A Trail Artist of '49'". The Luther college 60-piece concert band of Decorah, Iowa, will be present in the afternoon and evening. Dr. E. L. House will lecture at 4 o'clock on the subject, "A Survey of the Field of Religion and Psychology".

The history class, under the instruction of Prof. M. J. Fenenga, will discuss the subject, "The Nile Valley Speaks for Itself", at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, and the 11 o'clock forum will be presided over by Dr. Levi T. Pennington, president of Pacific college at Newberg. A picnic will be enjoyed at noon by the Pacific college alumni.

At 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon "The Old Frontier", a pageant-play, will be presented and will be repeated at 8 o'clock in the evening. James W. Evans is the author and director of this pageant. Baseball, tennis and other sports will take place at 4 o'clock.

POSTAL RECEIPTS SHOW GOOD GAIN

The postal receipts for the Gresham postoffice for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1927, totaled \$12,946.15, a gain of \$804.53 or 7 per cent over the receipts of the previous year, which amounted to \$11,241.62.

The receipts for June, 1926, were \$823.28, and for June, 1927, \$946.08, a gain of 14 per cent. Approximately the same percentage of gain was made for the quarter ending June 30 over the same quarter last year, the figures being \$2856.90 and \$2420.36, respectively.

These figures show Gresham's gain to be considerably more than that of Portland, according to reports recently published. The gain for the month of June, 1927, over June, 1926, is given as 1.2 per cent, and for the year as 2.93 per cent.
